Mr. Kozar is in southern Oregon on state business and while there will visit Crater lake and deliver possibly two addresses on the trip from Salem.

Sam Kozar is one of the best informed men in Oregon on the business of the state, having been elected secretary of state twice. Prior to that he was deputy secretary under F. I. Dunbar, Frank Mensen, and Ben W. Olcott.

The secretary of state is a member of the board of control that governs every state activity and enterprise with the one exception, of the penitentiary. The entire state traffic enforcement is under his direction, and he is also a member of the boards of regents of our university, college and normal schools.

Mr. Kozar will spend the day in the city after his address at the chamber.
