

PELICANS WIN 6TH CONSECUTIVE GAME BY OUTSLUGGING DUNSMUIR

Last Scheduled Game Of Season Goes To Locals By 10-3 Score; Now Tie With Weed For Pennant And Playoff May Be Played Here Sunday

A herd of hungry Pelicans, with five straight victories to their credit, made it six straight wins Sunday afternoon down in northern California when they devoured Dunsmuir by a 10 to 3 score.

It was the final game of the regular S-K league season. By virtue of the win, and Weed's 10 to 5 victory over Mount Shasta earlier in the day, the Pelicans are tied with Weed at 11 wins and four defeats each, and a play-off will undoubtedly be played in Klamath Falls this coming Sunday. Arrangements have not been completed. A one-game play-off and a series of three games have been suggested, but neither team has come to an agreement as yet.

The Pelicans won three series during the season and lost two. Of the three games played with each club they beat Mount Shasta, Dunsmuir and McCloud each three times, while Weed and Yreka both trounced the Pelicans twice and were each beaten once.

The Oregonians slammed the ball hard Sunday, starting in the early innings to pile up runs as they had no desire to take chances on losing and thereby cheating themselves out of pennant possibilities. A lose would have ended the season, putting Klamath Falls just one game behind Weed.

With one on in the first inning Bert Arnold stalked to the plate, saw a nice one coming his way, took a healthy swing and the ball sailed 35 feet over the centerfield fence for what Dunsmuir officials say was the longest hit since Babe Ruth played an exhibition game there four years ago.

They kept piling up runs sporadically throughout the game for a total of 10 tallies and 11 hits. Street was hit freely but kept his hits scattered well enough to permit only three Dunsmuir runs to cross the plate. Street was given good support throughout the game.

ATHLETICS MEET SENATORS TODAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(United News)—Badly bruised but not yet crushed, the Philadelphia Athletics will make a last effort to get back in the running for the American league pennant, in a two day series with the Senators, which opens here Tuesday.

The Athletics trail Washington by three and one-half games, and must sweep the series to become a strong contender again. Should Philadelphia drop the entire set of games, Washington would virtually be assured of the 1925 championship.

By breaking even with the league leaders in their series opening Tuesday and keeping pace with the Senators throughout the rest of the week, the Athletics can go into big four game series with the Senators which opens at Philadelphia on Labor Day with a fair chance to win and again gain the top.

Following the short Washington series at the Capital, the Athletics will meet the Ruth-less Yanks in New York.

BABE RUTH SAYS IT'S SPITE WORK OF YANK LEADER

CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—(United News)—Chewing on the fact that Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, high commissioner of baseball had refused to postpone vacation plans to see him, Babe Ruth is speeding toward New York to lay his tribulations before Col. Jacob Ruppert, owner of the Yanks.

The Babe wanted to tell the commissioner his side of the argument that resulted in his being dropped from the Yank lineup by Manager Miller Huggins, who also added a \$5,000 fine to Babe's woe. But Landis even as the petulant Babe was steaming into Chicago tickled at being "back in the headlines" packed his bag and departed for a vacation in Michigan.

"He walked out on me," was Ruth's gloomy comment as he jumped a noon day train for New York.

But the deposed king of swat is still full of fight. "I have to wait ten days before making an appeal to Judge Landis," he told newspapermen. "I will go before him and demand that he take action. There is no reason for Huggins throwing me out of the team other than to avenge the poor showing made by the Yanks."

It was hot in Chicago Monday. So was the Babe, during his brief stay. He admitted his fears that he wouldn't "get anywhere" with Col. Ruppert, "because Huggins has got Col. Ruppert where he wants him and where he'll believe everything he says."

"Huggins had to have somebody for the goat and I'm it," the Babe added.

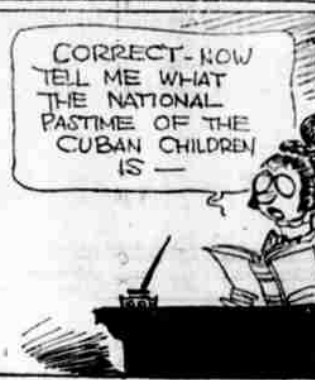

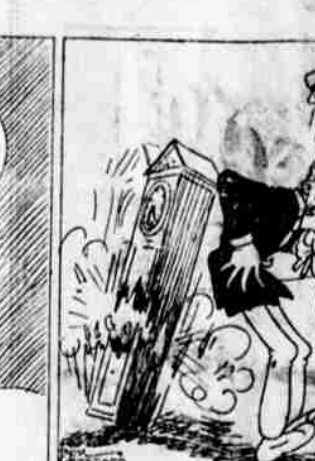
