

Pittsburgh Continues To Climb; Blankenship Turns In Another Win

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—(United News)—Toying with the St. Louis Cardinals in their own ball yard, the Pittsburgh Pirates had an easy time Thursday increasing their lead over the New York Giants in the National league to nine full games. The Bucaners won five to two.

The Giants, scheduled to play the Phillies at Philadelphia, were forced into idleness by rain. Cold weather brought the same fate to the scheduled Brooklyn-Braves battle at Boston.

In the west the Chicago Cubs celebrated the acquisition of George Gibson, former Pirate boss, as manager, succeeding Walter Maranville, resigned, by beating the Cincinnati Reds in the first game of a double header, 3 to 2. The Reds, however, took the after-piece 4 to 0.

Detroit rallied in the final innings of Thursday's game with Cleveland beat out an eight run lead the Indians had piled up.

Teddy Blankenship the White Sox pitcher, bested a string of St. Louis pitchers, and Chicago won, 3 to 1. There were only two games played in the American league.

KELLY OF S. P. IN CITY ON INSPECTION

R. E. Kelly, manager of development and promotion for the Southern Pacific railway lines, was a visitor in Klamath Falls yesterday.

He was here to direct briefly activities in a survey now underway to determine what the company will do should it be granted the concessions it seeks from the Interstate Commerce commission.

Except to express satisfaction as the results of his visit, Mr. Kelly had but little to say. Klamath Falls, he declared, seems to be in the grasp of prosperity, and he expressed the hope that soon greater benefits may be realized from the great country tributary to the city.

While here Mr. Kelly was accompanied about the country by K. C. Ingram, his assistant, who has taken up temporary residence in Klamath Falls.

Mr. Kelly, who was registered at the White Pelican hotel, left yesterday by automobile for Ashland where he will take a train for San Francisco.

RABBIT MARANVILLE RESIGNS AS CUB MANAGER; GIBSON TAKES JOB

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—(United News)—The managerial duties of the Chicago Cubs have been transferred from the shoulders of Walter "Rabbit" Maranville, bubbling little shortstop to those of George Gibson, the club's coach, and former manager of the Pirates.

The player-manager's regime lasted less than two months, during which period the club hovered most of the time on the cellar steps. The "Rabbit" found them in the chilling vicinity of the cellar and he leaves them there. He will remain on the team.

Returning ahead of the team after a more or less disastrous trip in the east, Maranville went into conference with President William L. Veach Thursday morning and emerged with ink on his fingers. "I resigned because the managerial du-

ties were too strenuous," explained the "Rabbit."

From then on he and the club officials were busy denying that it was all because the "Rabbit" could not live up to the training rules, which he himself set. It was denied that the somewhat boisterous party in the "Rabbit's" room in a Boston hotel had anything to do with the resignation.

Maranville began his term as manager two months ago in New York. He promptly celebrated the fact by getting into a row with a taxicab driver, and was hauled off to jail. Other incidents were reported from time to time, and though the "Rabbit's" rule was short, it undeniably was snappy. However, the Cubs remain in the vicinity of the cellar.

Gibson has been with the Cubs

since February. It is reported that he is to be manager for the remainder of the season only, and will be succeeded by Joe McCarthy, manager of the Louisville club of the American association.

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
