

PIRATES OF PENZANCE NIGHT SHOW AT FAIRGROUNDS IS HUGE SUCCESS

The story opens where Frederic, who has finished his apprenticeship, is leaving the pirates and believes it is his duty to exterminate them. With the appearance of beautiful girls the entire phase of the story changes and romance intermingled with a plot breathing with excitement and vigor discloses a most interesting story, worked up in a creditable manner.

Lynn Sabin as the Pirate King, with a swagger all his own and a death-like scimitar swinging from his sash, shared honors with Samuel, his Lieutenant, Rupert Maddox and Frederic, a Pirate Apprentice, George Maddox.

Walter West as Major General Stanley of the British army, carried off to perfection the "orphan general" and the father of the beautiful maidens who are to wed the pirates, after they are said to have been "noblemen gone wrong."

The necessary touch of the comique was brought out by Chris Barnstable as the sergeant of police and his ensemble of policemen out to slay the pirates.

The role of Ruth, the piratical maid of all work, was executed with a touch of professionalism that is seldom seen in Klamath Falls. The character was well portrayed in excellent voice by Nellie Andrews Hazelrigg.

General Stanley's daughters, Edith, Kate and Isabel were well taken by Peline Offield, Lynn Zimmerman and Ruth Lindsey.

EX-POLICE CHIEF HAS ASPIRATIONS

'Doctor' Powell Would Like To Support Klamath's 'Brilliant' Mayor

With a big, he-man sigh of resignation, Z. J. Powell, sometimes known as "Doc," has stepped forth reluctantly and tossed his sombrero in the political ring.

To Mr. Powell has come the voice of the people—a voice which he cannot find it in his heart to deny.

Cast his own personal fortunes to the winds—just like that—he has announced that he will be a candidate for alderman in the second ward.

Most of Mr. Powell's official statement doesn't say much about himself but concerns itself chiefly with Mayor Goddard.

Even admitting Mayor Goddard to be the upstanding, unbiased, servant of the people of whom Mr.

Powell is so fond, local politicians were last night speculating as to why Mr. Powell failed to refer, in any degree, to his own accomplishments or qualifications when he decided to run. Perhaps, some said, it was modesty.

Mr. Powell's rather dramatic statement follows:

"First of all I have in mind the giving of such assistance to the administration of Mayor Goddard as to make it the success the thinking people of the city want it to be. He has never missed an opportunity to do what he believed would be for the best interests of all the people, and I for one want to put into effect the broad plan of civic betterment that he has outlined. I believe he was right in his stand when he opposed to closing of the city to the Oregon Trunk and in his stand on the question of the common user, and I will, if elected, do everything I can to aid him along these lines. I am unalterably opposed to the closing of streets and

alleys for the benefit of private interests. If these people want this property which is the property of all the city, let them pay for it just the same as they would have to pay for it if acquired from private individuals. Even then I would not be in favor of closing these streets and alleys if such a step would be an injury to the property owners in the area affected.

"I believe that Klamath Falls is in need of what Mayor Goddard is trying to accomplish and it is chiefly because I want to see him put over his program of civic betterment that I decided to be a candidate. He is no man's mayor and I don't propose to be any man's councilman. When the time comes that this city must be turned over for the benefit of the few, I want to be on the

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
