

OREGON'S POWER IN CONGRESS IS REACHING HEIGHT

Never before in the history of the United States has Oregon held such a strong position in the congress as it does now.

Few people realize how thoroughly the committees shape, direct and control legislation and how important the committee places are.

With 435 members in the house and 96 in the senate, and with 4410 bills introduced in the senate and 12,474 in the house during the last congress, those familiar with legislation will understand how impossible it is to give consideration to such a mass of proposed legislation on the floor.

There are many committees, but a few handle practically all bills of general importance.

The committee on finance in the senate and ways and means in the house, consider all legislation affecting the income of the government, such as tariff or customs, income taxes, sales taxes and the internal revenues generally.

Positions upon these committees are more sought after than any others in congress.

Wide Representation

Out of a field of 27 senators seeking place on the finance committee at the beginning of the last congress to fill vacancies caused by the retirement of Senators McComber of North Dakota, Townsend of Michigan, Dillingham of Vermont, Calder of New York and Sutherland of West Virginia, Senator Stanfield of Oregon was selected for one. Senator Smoot of Utah is chairman of this committee in the senate and Congressman Hawley of Oregon is ranking member of the ways and means committee in the house.

The committees on public lands, which consider all legislation for the protection, utilization and disposition of the government lands, is very important to Oregon and the western states, where nearly all of the remaining public domain is located. Senator Stanfield is chairman of this committee in the senate and Congressman Sinnott of Oregon in the house.

The committee on civil service handles all bills referring to the classification, compensation, working conditions and retirement of federal employees. Senator Stanfield was chairman of this committee during the last session and is now ranking member, having relinquished the chairmanship to accept the chairmanship of public lands.

West Is in Power

The committee on postoffices and post roads considers all bills affecting the postal rates and service and the working conditions and compensation of the employes in the mail service. Senator Stanfield is a member of this committee. When he was put on it in 1921 he was number ten; now he is number four.

Senator Stanfield is also a member of the committee on claims, before which all claims against the government that require congressional action come.

Senator McNary is chairman of the committee on irrigation and reclamation (very important to Oregon and the semi-arid western states); ranking member of the committee on agriculture and forestry (which handles the appropriations for highways for the department of agriculture which includes the appropriations for highways, forest roads and trails, national parks, etc., in addition to general legislation affecting agriculture and forestry); ranking member of the committee on manufacturers, and number three on committee on commerce, of which Senator Jones of Washington is the

chairman. This committee handles all legislation affecting our rivers and harbors and the appropriations for their improvement. Senator McNary is also a member of the committee on committees.

May Continue Hold

Other western senators holding important committee chairmanships are Senators Warren of Wyoming, appropriations; Borah of Idaho, foreign relations; Johnson of California, immigration; Odell of Nevada, mines and mining, and Phipps of Colorado, labor and education.

The chairman of a committee practically controls the time of the committee meetings and the bills considered at such meetings.

The time is not long since Reed, Hale, Dingley and Frye of Maine, Aldrich of Rhode Island, Platt and Depew of New York, Crane and Lodge of Massachusetts, Quay, Penrose and Knox of Pennsylvania, and other strong men of the industrial eastern states controlled federal legislation by reason of their control of the important committees.

The passing of these men has passed the control of these committees to western men and through the seniority rule which is strictly adhered to will very largely give the control of federal legislation to the west if our representatives are retained in congress to hold their powerful committee positions.

Both of Oregon's senators are young men. One a jurist, trained in the law, the other experienced and skilled in agricultural and business.

Congressmen Hawley and Sinnott, by reason of ability and long service, have attained commanding positions in the house. Congressman Crumpacker, by reason of his ability and familiarity with congress through the long service of his father as a congressman from Indiana, will undoubtedly make his way rapidly.

Such a delegation in congress, working in full accord and harmony as they do, will soon make Oregon an outstanding state in shaping and directing federal legislation.

It would take new men, even though blessed with exceptional ability, many, many years to secure such powerful committee assignments as the Oregon members now hold, if indeed, they could ever get places of such vital importance to Oregon and the west.

"Had the plane still been afloat we would have found it before this," he said. "We feel certain now that the tragedy we feared has occurred."
