

Athletics Win One After Long Losing Streak of Twelve

Babe Ruth Celebrates His Return By Banging Out Homer At Boston

NEW YORK, Sept. 8. (United News)—The losing streak of the Athletics which had lengthened to 12 straight games, and had given promise of rambling on indefinitely, bumped to a stop Tuesday, when Connie Mack's youngsters slashed out a 6 to 4 win over the Senators at Philadelphia.

The win cut the vast lead of the champion Senators down to eight, which is still long enough virtually to assure them of their second pennant in two years. Washington nearly won the game with a three-run rally in the ninth, which was stopped just in time.

The only other items of interest in the American league Tuesday was the way the suddenly awakened Yanks beat the lowly Boston Red Sox twice, and Babe Ruth's sixteenth homer, which came in the second game of the second day of his return to the Yank fold. The Yanks beat Boston 5 to 4, and 7 to 4. The losses were the 23rd and 24th of the season for the Red Sox.

The chesty Pirates in the National league lost their second game by one run in two days, when the Chicago Cubs beat them at Pittsburgh, 3 to 2. The loss cut the Pirates' lead from eight and one-half games to just eight, because the Giants were dividing a double header with Boston. The Braves took the first, 3 to 2, but dropped the afterpiece to New York, 5 to 4.

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THE OLD ROMANTIC WEST IS GONE FOREVER, SAYS SENATE COMMITTEE

Picturesque "Open Range" Country Will Pass With New System Of Leasing Public Lands For Long Time Period; Portland Hearing

PORTLAND, Sept. 8.—(United News)—No doubt of it, the old romantic west is passing.

One sitting in the dark federal court room Tuesday, listening to the figures juggled back and forth by witnesses before members of the senate public lands committee in public hearing, presently became conscious of a whisper behind the figures. The whisper said:

"The old west is passing."

In fact, it was quite apparent that within a few years at the most, a cow puncher in southeastern Oregon won't be able to ride as far as fifty miles without coming to a fence.

This seemed to be a good thing in the opinion of W. S. Boyer, division inspector of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and E. G. Allen, head of the western forestry and conservation commission.

They presented their practical facts and figures to Senators Stanford, Oregon and Cameron, Arizona. They sought to impress on the committee that it would be desirable to lease range lands to ranchers for ten year periods, with options of re-leasing. At present yearly permits are granted by the interior department to cattle men.

If long rentals were permitted, it was argued, it would be an economy, because cattle owners could then fence the ranges. They could take better care of the lands, and the leases would approach a semblance of ownership.

But the old open ranges would be no more. The rolling hills of sage brush and greasewood—as endless
