Biggest Beer Seizure In Illinois Is Made

CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—(United News)—The biggest seizure of real beer ever made in the state of Illinois resulted Wednesday in the capture of five carloads of beer, three trucks, the arrest of seven men and the charge by dry agents here of "apparent collusion" of the New York Central railroad "with violators in assisting them to illegally divert beer which has been routed over their lines."

Excitement marked the raid as a dry squad beat off 35 to 40 men and boys who attempted to hinder the work of the raiders as they descended on the beer cars at suburban Morton Grove. Dry agents declare that these men probably were lookouts of the bootleg crew.
