GREATEST CIVIL WAR IN HISTORY IS BEING FOUGHT

Harold Dollar Says Soviet Has Nation Throttled; Need Iron Leader

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—The greatest civil war in history is rending China. More than 2,000,000 men are under arms in a country whose cities are rapidly succumbing to the propaganda of bolshevism. China has the largest army in the world, and is potentially the wealthiest nation in the world, and yet she is unable to maintain lawful order or to pay her debts without foreign supervision.

These are some of the contrasts contained in a summation of the Chinese problem given to the United News by Harold Dollar, son of Robert Dollar, whose shipping and commercial interests in China are probably greater than those of any other foreigner.

Harold Dollar is director of all the Dollar interests in the far east. He built in Shanghai, the only modern office building in China, a sky-scraper for China, although it is but eight stories high.

"What China needs," Dollar said, "is a dictator. Division and decentralization have demoralized the republican revolution of 1911, and there is further division and demoralization in store accompanied with not a little violence until a strong man appears to restore order."

"This five-headed military dragon is not a favorite with the Chinese people, for its soldiers under one tuchun or another have trampled their fields, stolen their animals, raped their women and pillaged their homes. Yet the Chinese farmer says nothing, or if he murmurs, he does nothing. The time will come when the abused Chinese will rise against the mal-administration of tuchuns and the festering bolshevism of the cities and smash them. That will happen unless a Chinese Napoleon appears, a man the country dwellers and merchants can trust and who will endeavor to better the condition of China instead of merely trying to stuff his purse or to inflate his personal power."

There are two Chinese now in sight, Dollar said, who may possess the ability to consolidate China—Chang Tso Lin, titular military governor of Manchuria; actually the absolute ruler of it; and Wu Pei Fu, who was forced into retirement in Honan last summer, when the Christian General Feng Hu Hsiang treacherously seized Peking, while Wu was at the head of an army fighting Chang.

Masked Men Enter Home of Murdered Prohibition Woman

VINTON, Iowa, Sept. 10.—(United News)—While her husband, the Rev. C. S. Kleckner, pastor of Christ's church here, assisted with the funeral services of Mrs. C. B. Cook, W. C. T. U. president, murdered Monday night, the Kleckner home was entered Thursday afternoon by two masked men, who demanded to know of Mrs. Kleckner, if her husband was a clansman.

"Tell us the truth or we will manhandle you," one of the invaders shouted.

Trembling with fright, Mrs. Kleckner told the pair that she did not think her husband belonged to the clan order. The men then disappeared.

Police were summoned and blood hounds shipped here from Waterloo in an effort to trace the pair. State Agent T. L. Kendall and Sheriff Witefield Ruhl, investigating the murder of Mrs. Cook, are directing the investigation into the latest sensational episode to rock Vinton from its agristic obscurity.

Will War on Pine Beetle in Klamath

Continuation of control work in the destructive pine beetle ravage will be definitely decided according to Jack Kimball and several rangers of the Klamath Forest Protective association who will meet with J. E. Patterson, forest entomologist for the federal government in Ashland.

Before the establishment of two beetle control camps is accomplished the advice of the government expert is needed. With Mr. Kimball and the members of the association, several private timber owners are expected to be present to urge the establishment of the camps and the continuation of the work in exterminating the pests.

ORAL BOMBS TO BE DROPPED ON GOTHAM VOTERS

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—New York trembles in terror as it prepares for the great upheaval, the devastating explosion that will turn the town upside down on the very eve of the mayoralty primary elections next Tuesday. Who is the little girl, found in a dark alley years ago, whose atrocious murder will be laid at the door of one candidate or another the night before the voters go to the polls to do their worst?

Which orphanage, burned to the ground, will have its charred ruins thrown before the door of the other candidate?

It is yet too early to say. But the voters soon expect to know these things, together with information on who killed cock robin, who kidnaped Charley Ross and who committed other celebrated crimes unsolved all these years.

Mr. Hearst and Governor Smith got away to a good running start, which was only a faint promise of what may come next week.

An ominous silence comparatively speaking has spread over the democratic party primary contest this week and there have been few scathing personal charges.

It has been suggested that the half dozen principal characters in this battle have been political bed-fellows so long and know so much about each other that if any one of them were to start spilling the real beans, all concerned would be ruined in a day.
