Editor Pleads Not Guilty of Slaying

LAS VEGAS, N. M., Sept. 11.—(United News)—Weak and showing visible effects of his recent beating at the hands of his old enemy, former Judge David Leahy, Carl Magee, editor of the New Mexico State Tribune at Albuquerque, was arraigned in justice court here Friday, pleaded not guilty to a charge of murder and was released on \$10,000 bond.

Magee waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to district court of San Miguel county. The case is expected to be called for trial during the December docket.

The charges against Magee grew out of the fatal shooting of John B. Lassiter, a state employe, who interceded as the well known editor fired a shot at Judge Leahy, who had knocked him to the floor and was beating him in a hotel here. In two more shot fired by Magee, Leahy was wounded in the arm.
