NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 11.—Dr. John M. Thompson, senior resident physician of the Essex county insane asylum, was asked to resign Friday night by the Shire's board of free holders.

This followed an investigation into the escape and freedom of young Harrison Noel of Montclair, confessed murderer of six-year-old Mary Daly and Raymond Pierce, who was for a time an inmate of the institution.
