

### CITY'S SANITARY PLIGHT IS SCORED MAYOR VETOES SPUR

Job and that he has a comprehensive knowledge of the dairy situation here. "I think," Dr. Newsom said, "that Dr. Lamb has done his work faithfully, and I believe that he is entitled to have a competent assistant."

The man to be employed as assistant to Dr. Lamb will serve also as a patrolman in Klamath Falls. Chief of Police Harry Loucks said that an extra man may be used at any time. Contending that the assistant to Dr. Lamb would have plenty of work to keep him busy, Mayor Goddard suggested that an all-time man should be employed, but the council failed to fall in line with his idea.

"I'll be glad to have Craft on the force," Chief Loucks said. "We're busy most of the time as it is, and we can use him whenever he's not engaged in other work."

The vacating of the several streets proposed will be considered by the council at a later date.

The improvement of Pine street, sought last night by certain property owners, was referred to the street committee.

#### Sanitation Is "Rotten"

Dr. Lamb, in speaking of sanitary conditions in and about Klamath Falls, was very pointed in his remarks. "I was told I could have an officer when I asked for one," he said. "Sometimes I got one—sometimes I didn't. The conditions at the dairies, in some instances, are not what they should be. I believe that the sanitary situation is the rottenest it has been in five years."

Dr. Lamb said he would reconsider his resignation, in view of the action taken by the aldermen.

#### Mayor Vetoes Again

The mayor's veto statement, regarding the Lake Ewauna concession, was in part, as follows:

"I am returning disappointed, that certain resolutions passed at the regular meeting September 8, by the council, in which the Sawmill Engineering and Construction company is granted the right to build a railroad track along and near the east shore of Lake Ewauna.

"This resolution would permit the Sawmill Engineering and Construction company to build railroad tracks near the east shore of Lake Ewauna from the property of the Big Lakes Box company to a point near the south end of Payne alley.

"Such a railroad would make it practically impossible for any competing railroad to build tracks to serve the mills and factories along this lake. Thus it would give a monopoly to the owners of this so-called industrial spur.

#### Open Town—For Railroads

"I believe that this 'industrial spur' is being paid for and being built at the instance of one of the great railroad systems which is trying to keep out all competing roads. Furthermore, to my mind, it is only a subterfuge to build this spur so that, later, it can be turned into a commercial track that can be connected to the property owned by this railroad on the west side of Lake Ewauna. My reasons for so thinking are the various statements made by Robert E. Strahorn to the park board and to the common council."

The mayor, in his statement, insisted that a "common user" clause should be inserted in any agreement made with any railroad.

Bend to Susanville, from the Idaho border to the Pacific shore, has a right to demand that we keep an open door to all railroad development," the mayor said. "We not only owe this duty to all the citizens of our vast country, but we owe it to all the unborn children of the ages yet to come. I therefore veto the resolution."

## S. P. TO EXTEND ROUTE TO EAST

to acquisition and development of the other lines in southern Oregon and northern California has already been made and need not be commented on further. It is proper to say, however, that there is not enough traffic existing or potential, to support the proposed extension of the Northern lines from Bend to Klamath Falls in addition to our own very comprehensive plans, and this fact is of first consequence to us.

"These plans, as announced, look toward the support of the revenue derived from hauling the traffic of the mills either established or to be built upon our lines or on the lines of the Oregon-California and Eastern railway and such mills as may be established on the Nevada-California-Oregon railway by extensions into the basins tributary on the one hand to Klamath Falls and on the other to Lakeview, as the demand for logs and lumber makes reasonable.

It is, therefore, proper to add that if the Northern lines are granted permission to come into Klamath Falls to share the traffic in that section and the territory immediately enroute, then we cannot undertake to go ahead with our plans as outlined."
