

HEARING ON AIR DISASTERS GETS GOING TOMORROW

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The air services of the government tonight stood at the threshold of an era of searching investigations, in which past policies will be tested in the crucible of expert analysis, and new policies possibly devised.

Two weeks to a day from the time Colonel Mitchell shook the defense establishments of the nation to their foundation with sensational charges of "incompetency, criminal negligence and almost treasonable administration," found tonight the formal inquiries ready to move forward.

On Monday morning at 10:30, the first session of President Coolidge's aircraft board will convene in a committee room of the house of representatives office buildings here, and at the same time a navy investigation into the Shenandoah disaster will formally be brought to order at Lakehurst, N. J.

A sweeping investigation into the whys and wherefores of the existing aviation establishment will be attempted by the former, while the latter delve into the testimony of survivors of the fatal airship crash and the mute evidence offered by wreckage salvaged from the disaster's scene, in an effort to determine the cause of, and if possible, preventatives for such accidents.

The inquiry board here will be under the chairmanship of Dwight F. Morrow of J. P. Morgan and company, an old college friend of President Coolidge. The Lakehurst probe will be conducted by Rear Admiral Hilary Jones, chief of the naval staff.

Acting Secretary of War Dwight Davis is scheduled to appear as the first witness here. Flanked by an escort of technical experts and advisers, including Maj. Gen. Mason M. Patrick, chief of the army air service, and Maj. Gen. John L. Hines, chief of the army staff, Davis will lay before the investigators the complete story of the army's air policies.

\$100,000 Alienation Affections Suit Filed

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Mrs. Frances Colt denied tonight charges made against her in a \$100,000 suit for alienation of affections filed against her by Mrs. Eva C. Martin.

Mrs. Colt denied "as without foundation," Mrs. Martin's charge that she had alienated her husband's affections since her arrival here. Mrs. Colt is alleged to have said she would willingly give Mrs. Martin \$100,000 if she was guilty of the charge.

Mrs. Martin declared she would not grant her husband, Merton Martin a divorce but that she will need the \$100,000 for which she is suing, to support herself.

Failure to Dim on Wet Streets Cause for Ticket-Knowles

Automobile drivers are being given with this notice, their last warning about dimming lights on a wet, black pavement. County Traffic Officer Knowles announced last night, after witnessing several near-accidents on Klamath streets, due to failure to dim.

Many people have the impression, since the new dimming law went into effect, that dimming is not compulsory under any conditions.

Knowles wishes to warn every driver that on wet streets it is necessary to dim.

"I have been letting people off with a warning up until this time, but I'm going to start giving them a ticket from now on," Knowles declared.

Knowles also calls attention to the new regulation requiring a speed limit of five miles when turning from a market or county road on to a main highway.

MINISTERS TAKE A FLING AT ROBERT

BAKER, Ore., Sept. 19.—The Baker Ministerial association, through its chairman, the Rev. Leslie Logan Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian church took a fling at Senator R. N. Stanfield in a written statement made public tonight.

In the statement the minister contends that they are "fully satisfied that on the evening of September 13, in the Senate cafe, Senator Stanfield was exceedingly drunk and disorderly and that he was guilty of resisting the officer, who arrested him."

The ministers also rap local prominent citizens, who signed the written statement in which they attempted to shield Stanfield from the disgrace of being drunk and disorderly, and instead of defending the officer have "launched a wholly unjustified attack upon the good faith of the officer who arrested him."

The statement continues with deepest bitterness in attacks on the junior Oregon senator and recommends that as soon as possible his retirement to private life.
