SPORTS DONE BROWN

Some weeks ago we criticized the move of the British golf officials in arranging the pairings in the British women's championship matches that Miss Glenna Collett of the United States faced the task of defeating both Joyce Wethered, England's present champ, and Miss Cecil Leith, long the feminine wizard of British links, if she wished to win the title. Meanwhile, Miss Leitch and Miss Wethered played through the seeded draw in different brackets, it being possible for them to meet only in the finals.

Now, however, we see the American tennis officials committing the same error. Miss Elizabeth Ryan, invading her home shores for the first time in thirteen years, was rated as one of the most formidable of the British visitors, Miss Kathleen McKane, by virtue of her play in the British tourney this year and her ard fought matches with Miss Wills, was rated second. The drawings were so seeded that these two stars had to meet and fight it out before either reached Miss Wills.

This does not seem to be good sportsmanship even though the elimination of this fault would handicap the home stars.

The presence of Peter De Paolo, America's 1925 auto racing king, and Tommy Milton in Italy has renewed the sorrow felt by that country over the death of Ascari, Italian auto racing idol. Followers of the speedway sport there had long asked for a meeting between Ascari and America's stars, and when De Paolo originally booked passage for Italy it was for the purpose of meeting Ascari in a championship race. Plans were also well under way for the visit of Ascari to this country and a return race.

The sportsmanship of the Italian public is evident in their reception of De Paolo and Milton. Deprived of a chance to see their hero in action against America's best, they still want to see the visitors to compare them with Ascari.

When the sport history of 1925 is written the death of Ascari must be chronicled as one of the tragedies of the year. His death was not only a severe blow to the game and a great blow to Italy but it ended his career just at a time when he planned to add American conquests, and Italy was hopeful that he and Paolo, America's auto racing king, would meet.

The extent to which Italy worshipped Ascari is indicated by the presence of Premier Mussolini at the funeral. The man who led the black shirted Fascisti to power in Italy not only attended the funeral, but placed a tiny gold crown on the racer's grave.

Dazzy Vance will have to start cutting the corners again in his well known and fairly proficient style if he hopes to better the strike-out mark he hung up last year.

He whiffed a total of 262 in the 1924 campaign while hogging the pitching honors in that circuit. On a recent date Vance's total of strikeouts for this year was 166. His total up to the same date last year was 177. This difference, however, should not be fatal to the Brooklyn star at this time. Two or three good games—the kind Dazzy pitches when he is at his best—would rush that total up to his 1924 mark and possibly beyond it.

Dazzy is far, far away from his 1924 record of victories. He needs around 10 to equal his record of 28 for last year. And at the pace he and his team are going now this is

an almost impossible task. He is, however, still the pitching ace of the Brooklyn Dodgers, and one of the big winning pitchers of the league.
