Widely Diversified Temperatures Felt Over United States

CHICAGO, Sept. 19. — (United Press)—With the autumn equinox only two days away, the country is experiencing an exceptionally wide diversity of weather. Henry J. Cox, of the federal weather bureau here said today.

While the midwest sweltered, and the east reported moderate temperatures, four inches of snow, accompanied by freezing temperatures, fell in the mountain regions of Montana.

The same elements that produced snow in the northwest will spread eastward tonight and Sunday, Cox said, bringing thunder showers and variable winds. No snow is forecast for this area.

Abnormally high temperatures will continue over Sunday in Kansas and Missouri, tonight's forecast said. The northern plains, the upper Mississippi valley and the western lake region are in the rain area.

Numerous cities in Nebraska, Indiana and Kansas today reported

temperatures ranging from 92 to 100 degrees. A moderate west wind brought only slight relief at St. Paul, where the temperature was 85 degrees. Oklahoma City reported a temperature of 89, and at Dallas, Texas, it was 90.
