Posse Is Grubstaked
The party is being grubstaked at the expense of the county. "We owe it to Owensby and his family to bend every effort toward finding the missing man," declared Judge Bunnell yesterday.

"The party will leave early this morning. Owensby is somewhere on Huckleberry mountain, and I believe with this new exhaustive search he will be found dead or alive. He was not clothed to endure long the cold mountain nights, but as for food, he could live on huckleberries for a month to come. There are numerous little streams flowing down the mountain side, and he would have little difficulty in finding water.

Fate Still Mystery
"He may have wandered to the Red Blanket country, on the other side of the mountain. That is 50 miles from the cabin he disappeared from. That Red Blanket country is a place I wouldn't want to be lost in. It is a succession of winding canyons, and a man might be lost in that country for weeks and weeks without being able to work his way out.

"The searching party will be equipped with a compass, and have instructions not to go out of calling distance from each other when the Red Blanket country is reached."

ENGINE TROUBLES NOT HELD CAUSE OF AIRSHIP LOSS

LAKEHURST, N. J., Sept. 25.—The Shenandoah will never fly again, but her wreckage holds the loyalty of her senior surviving officer as firmly as when the big ship bore him proudly on the flight which ended in disaster over Ohio on September 3.

There has been testimony, reams of it, since the naval court of inquiry opened and some of it has contained suggestions of criticism of the once proud queen of the air. Lieut. Commander Charles L. Rosendahl, senior officer, Friday had his day at cross-examining witnesses.

In a few sharp strokes he had dispelled the theory, advanced on Thursday by Col. Charles G. Hall, an army observer, that the failure of the dirigible's engines had caused the crash. Col. Hall had testified that if all the Shenandoah's engines had been working, the accident might have been averted. But once in the storm, he added, the full engine power would not have saved it. It had been brought out in earlier sessions that two of the five engines were stopped before the break.

Commander Rosendahl showed by questioning Col. Hall, that the army officer had not known when the engines stopped and that they were not out of commission until after the ship was declared drawn into the center of rough weather.

The senior officer plunged into his cross examination of the various witnesses with ardor and at one time Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones, president of the court cautioned him against "framing questions so that the witness' answers were suggested."

FAMILY TROUBLES ARISE OVER AUTO

The name of Bradshaw is again thrown in the limelight after a recess of several months when A. W. Bradshaw, head of the house

of Bradshaw appeared in the police court and requested the assistance of the police in obtaining the recovery of his car from his wife yesterday morning.

Feeling that the affair was but a "family squabble" the police declined to interfere.

During the latter part of the summer June and Esther Bradshaw were brought to the public eye of Oregon when they were believed to have been murdered, kidnaped or spirited away when their presence, unmolested in Portland proved matters to the contrary. They are now with their father on the Bradshaw ranch in the bleak Tale Lake country of Modoc county.

Mother Bradshaw is alleged to have the family motor and residing in Klamath Falls, refusing the return of the automobile to her husband.

Now Bradshaw is back tending sheep without a car and bewailing the fact that his numerous family is forced to walk 12 miles to school every day.

Prisoners Pay for Easy Jail Life, Is Testified in Court

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—Frankie Lake and Terry Druggan, the jovial alchemists who turned the beer

from their many Chicago breweries in much gold, took the witness stand in federal court here Friday to tell how they were able to lead a pleasant existence in and out of the county jail, while serving sentences of one year each.

"It was easy," testified Frankie, "we paid for it, and paid plenty." That was the gist of the story told

by both Druggan and Frankie. Frankie testified first. It was the first time he had consented to talk since Judge James Wilkerson, several days ago, set out to determine who should be cited for contempt for making jail life plenty dandy for beer lords, with large bank accounts.

When Frankie finished what he

had to say, Judge Wilkerson, out waiting for confirmation, Druggan, ordered the arrest of Harry Thompson, former jail warden and Henry Forest, who was Druggan's secretary. It was the officials, according to Druggan, much was said and done.
