HARMONIOUS CO-OPERATION NECESSARY

One item of news in this morning's paper should cause more than passing notice. The city council at its last night's meeting issued a call for an election to fill a vacancy of alderman for the second ward.

It may appear to some that only second ward residents are interested in this election—but every citizen of the city is vitally concerned for more reasons than one.

Klamath Falls is facing an epochal era—there are more eyes on Klamath Falls and Klamath county at the present time than perhaps on any other section of the west. With the talked-of railroad development; with the building activities; with the industrial opportunities fast being exploited, and the many other developments contiguous, Klamath is indeed receiving much comment and notice.

This era of prosperity is the inevitable result of development of the rich natural resources which our city and county command—and has come about even in spite of inspired obstacles, placed in the way by obstructionists and alarmists, whose sole aim appears to be to rule or ruin.

It behooves every citizen—voter in second ward or not—to lend every influence toward electing as alderman in the second ward a man who is big enough, broad enough and sane enough to sit with the aldermen from the other four wards and do his duty fearlessly and without favor, just as his constituents are lending every effort to do, so that Klamath Falls will not only be noticed, but noticed favorably by the outside world, and acted upon favorably, as well.

We must make Klamath synonymous with progressive action, and accelerate that progress by harmonious cooperation in our city governing body.

BELIEVES CREW HAS PERISHED IN CRAFT

VALLEJO, Calif., Sept. 28.—Lieut. Commander Charles M. Cooke who was in command of the submarine S-5 when it sank off Del Norte bay five years ago, believes that the crew of the S-51 perished immediately after the craft was rammed last Friday.

"We lived in the S-5 for 37 hours," he said Monday, "but that was largely because the ship wasn't injured in a collision, as was the S-51."

There is little parallel between the two disasters, according to Cooke. "We sank because of an open valve, while submerged," he said. "Our hull was uninjured, and although water was pouring in we were able to raise the stern above the water and keep a compartment water tight. We suffered little after our predicament became known." Cooke feels that water entered the S-51 too quickly for the men to seek shelter in a segregated compartment. He declared that lack of any response when divers tapped on the hull was a strong indication that the men were dead. At present Cooke is stationed at the Mare Island navy yard here.

\$150,000 GIVEN KLAMATH TRIBES

Approximately \$150,000 will be issued this week to every man, woman and child of Indian blood on the Indian reservation at \$200 per capita, according to an announcement made last night by L. D. Arnold, superintendent of the Klamath reservation, who said that payment might possibly be made today to the 1,250 members of the tribes.

The money to be received by the Indians is accumulation of tribal funds in the United States treasury for the sale of timber lands formerly belonging to the Indians.

Payment has been authorized by the Indian office in Washington, D. C., however, according to Arnold, the funds have not yet been placed to his official credit. With the receiving of the credit the checks will be issued at once. According to schedule the payment was authorized on September 11.

An effort will be put forth, according to Arnold, to have the payments semi-annually and not irregularly as they have been in the past years. The annual income from the sale of the timber from which the payments are made reaches approximately \$700,000 yearly. The funds are deposited in the treasury of the United States and paid to the Indians by order of the secretary of the interior.

LONDON THIEVES MAKE CLEAN HAUL

LONDON, Sept. 28. — (United News)—A new mark for thoroughness in thievery is believed to have been set by burglars here.

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 28.—(United News)—There is no honor among thieves in Texas. The state prison commission meeting here Monday decided to abolish the honor farm at Imperial state prison near Sugarland, after agreeing that the project established during the reign of Gov. Pat Neff had proved a failure. Reports to the prison commissioners were to the effect that thus far this year 49 convicts had betrayed the trust the state had placed in them.

HOUSTON, Sept. 28.—Ten of the 12 men who will weigh the fate of Max Fink, former orchestra leader, on trial in criminal district court, on a charge of criminal assault on a young girl, had been picked when court adjourned Monday.

Fink pleaded not guilty after Judge Robison had overruled a motion for delay, based on the absence of witnesses.

Fink and H. Johnson, another musician were arrested three months ago charged with assault upon two young girls. Johnson now is in jail here waiting trial on charge of criminal assault.
