## Aged Resident Dies Result of Accident

Falling 15 feet to the ground from a raised scaffolding on Saturday afternoon, William Michael Swartzfager, aged 83, died from internal injuries and crushed ribs at 9 o'clock Sunday night. Swartzfager resided at 2432 White avenue. Injuries which later proved fatal to the aged man occurred when Swartzfager was building a small house on White avenue. The scaffolding proved insecure and the man fell heavily to the ground.

He is survived by three children, C. G. Swartzfager of Ashland, J. W. Swartzfager of Klamath Falls and Mrs. Fannie Matney of Ruch, Jackson county. The remains will be shipped today to Jacksonville, where funeral services will be held and interment made in the family plot.

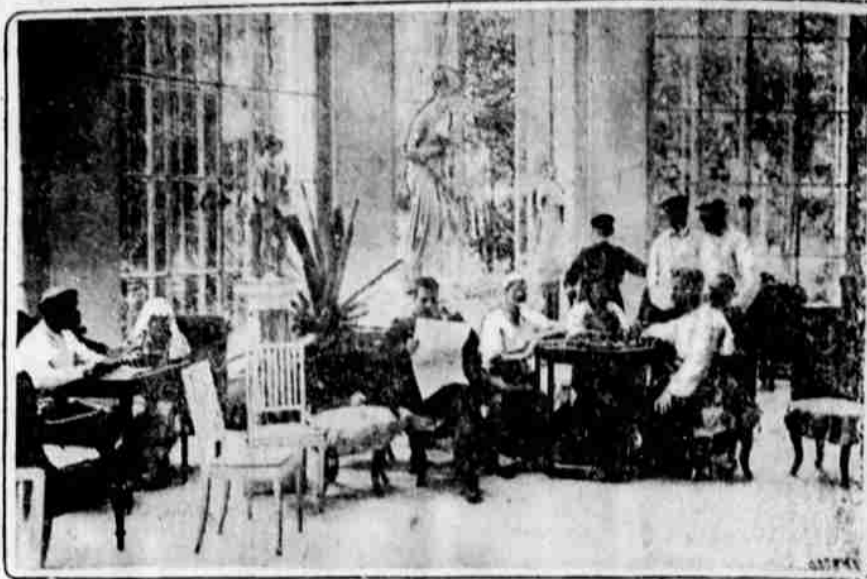
