

AIRMEN TESTIFY TO OPINIONS ON PRESENT SYSTEM

Aircraft Board Hears Officers Declare for Separate Force for Aeronautics

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(United News)—Headless of alleged efforts to "muzzle" them, naval aviators have joined their flying comrades of the army, in charging before President Coolidge's aircraft board that the government's air policy requires drastic revision.

Flying officers of the sea defense, who testified Thursday in the wake of such advocates of an independent air service as Col. William Mitchell and Gen. Mason Patrick, were emphatic in their assertions that naval aviators, without exception, favored a separate air force.

Frankly and without the hesitation and indecision which marked the testimony of Admiral William A. Moffett, head of the naval air service, in the presence of Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, witnesses combined in declaring that unless the air force was trained, operated and controlled by experienced aviators the navy would meet disaster in the next emergency it faced.

They as frankly gave the board the grievances of naval aviators and their proposals for remedies. Lieut. Commander R. R. Pannock chief of the flight division of the bureau of aeronautics, and Lieut. Commander H. T. Bartlett of the naval war college, told the board that they knew of naval aviators who had expressed an unwillingness to give their opinions to the inquiry board.

However, they neither made public the names of the officers alleged to have been "muzzled" nor the sources from which a hint had come that reticence was desirable.

Through the day's testimony and examination, the witnesses, all naval flying men, informed the board repeatedly that the men in the air service advocated a separate air corps and disapproved the existing policies and system.

The binding public commitments of the Southern Pacific company with respect to the Tale Lake main line east follows:

Through the applications made and such other applications as are necessary the Interstate Commerce commission will be asked for authority to create a line through from Klamath Falls to connect with the Central Pacific, giving a route via Ogden that will be reasonably direct and avoid the present longer haul through Weed; and upon approval of the commission we will promptly undertake the construction of this line and build it within the time set by the commission.—From letter of Paul Shoup, executive vice president, Southern Pacific company, to Klamath county chamber of commerce, July 3, 1925.

"Investigation of the best route has now reached the point where we can announce the main line east from Klamath Falls will run through Tale lake to a suitable connection with the Nevada-California-Oregon broadgauge, thence connecting with the Central Pacific main line in Nevada.—Telegram from Wm Sproule, president Southern Pacific company, to Klamath county chamber of commerce, September 15, 1925.

Your present inquiry deals particularly with the proposed lines from Klamath Falls through Tale Lake via Merrill and Cornell to a

connection with the N. C. O. railway.

Southern Pacific company proposes to build that line provided that the Interstate Commerce commission approves our program for the development of your territory and grants the necessary certificates which the law requires as to obtain, and second that the actual and potential traffic afforded by the Klamath territory is not opened to destructive competition such as would result from the entry of the proposed branch line extension of the Oregon Trunk railway south from Reed in the Klamath country.—Telegram from Wm Sproule, president, Southern Pacific company, to Klamath county chamber of commerce, Sept. 21, 1925.
