## Town Nuisance At It Again

Repudiated and apologized for by the Oregon Trunk officials to whom the method of his championship proved as offensive as it was humiliating to Klamath Falls, the publisher of the local evening paper has now appointed himself spokesman for the Southern Pacific.

In an editorial—editorial might be a better name—he made the announcement yesterday that the Klamath Falls-Alturas line never will be built.

On this point nothing could be clearer than the following statement to the Klamath Falls Chamber of Commerce by Paul Shoup, Executive Vice-President Southern Pacific Company and the recent telegram to the Chamber of Commerce from William Sproule, President of the Southern Pacific. These gentlemen are really spokesmen for the railroad company.

### Mr. Shoup Said:

Through the applications made and such other applications as are necessary, the interstate commerce commission will be asked for authority to create a line through from Klamath Falls to connect with the Central Pacific, giving a route via Ogden that will be reasonably direct, and avoid the present longer haul through Weed; and upon approval of the commission we will promptly undertake the construction of this line and build it within the time set by the commission.

### And here's Mr. Sproule's telegram:

Investigation of the best route has now reached the point where we can announce the main line east from Klamath Falls will run through Tule lake to a suitable connection with the Nevada California Oregon broadgauge, thence connecting with the Central Pacific main line in Nevada.

Klamath Falls will prefer these official promises to the vaporings of the town nuisance.

That this aforesaid nuisance is willing to sacrifice Klamath Falls to his private hate may be seen on the front page of the same edition of his paper, where a big heading announces: "Road South Is Not Important As Crane Line." Consistency thou art a jewel!
