DOAH WAS ASSERTS EXPERT

Was Informed of Approaching Storm, Says Eyewitness

DOAH, N. J., Oct. 1.—(United News)—Commander Zachary Lansdowne of the Shenandoah, is sure to fly the course fixed by navy orders, disregarded the weather expert's warnings shortly before the ship was destroyed. Capt. Joseph Anderson, the ship's aerologist, testified at Tuesday's session of the naval court of inquiry into the disaster. A change of course might have saved the craft, he said.

There was no warning of the storm which destroyed the dirigible in the rash of winds which tore it to pieces, but the destructive force could have been avoided in daylight, the weather man said. In the session the court heard a wire from Mrs. Lansdowne saying she was "very despondent" after the disaster. Anderson, appearing as a witness, testified immediately after the court that her husband feared the safety of his ship in the night, and prompted the court to give him the opportunity of testing his theory.

Anderson testified that at the time he warned Lansdowne to change the course from west to north, there were no signs of a storm which would prove dangerous. Lansdowne give any reason for heading your advice," Anderson asked.
