

FEDERAL CASES KLAMATH TO BE CALLED OCT. 6

Medford Term of Court Opens With Charges Against Men Well Known Here

When the Medford term of court opens in the valley city at nine o'clock Tuesday morning, the first of October, five cases will be brought to trial before the federal court which will be of keen interest to residents of Klamath Falls and Klamath county. One case also will be of interest to Lakeview, as well.

According to C. C. Wells, deputy United States marshal, who has been in the city today gathering material and witnesses for the five trials, the cases to come before the judges are of more importance than for several years.

The first case to be brought up is that of Wilbur Eggesman, an Indian, who was indicted by the federal grand jury in Portland last week, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon and attempt to kill, upon Monroe Faithful. This case caused much interest in Klamath when a knife, which was used upon Faithful, pierced the latter's heart without fatal results.

C. E. Mose, whose case of forgery upon Fred A. Baker, former superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, occurred last spring, will also be brought before the federal court in Medford. Mose stole checks from the office of Baker, cashing them upon William Harris, storekeeper at Chiloquin.

An old case to be brought up is that of Jesse Turner, who was indicted by the grand jury on a liquor charge.

William H. Todd, who was arrested on April 21, charged with illegal possession of intoxicating liquor in the "Todd and McCampbell" case, will have his hearing before the court, with a number of witnesses in evidence. Another bit of evidence to be produced is a keg of liquor from the sheriff's office, to be used in bringing about Todd's conviction.

Of interest to Lakeview residents is the case of Charles E. Arzner, young employe of the Lakeview postoffice, who is charged with embezzlement of funds from the post-office. Arzner had been a trusted employe in that department for more than six years, and his arrest occurred during the latter part of the summer, when it was alleged that funds had been missing from the C. O. D. and money order departments of the office.

Pledge Campaign to Start Next Monday

Monday morning will see the beginning of a campaign to clean up the pledges to the citizens-students' committee, according to the plan adopted yesterday afternoon, when the committee met in the chamber of commerce. H. D. Mortenson is chairman of the group, assisted by five others. The men are selected from the various organizations of the city, including the chamber of commerce, the Rotary, and two from the Y. M. C. A.

Under the guidance of the committee, four teams will be picked from the student body of the high school, and the town divided into as many districts. The ticket sale has been sponsored by civic organizations throughout the city. The price of the tickets are \$10, which admit the holder to four games of football, basketball, baseball and three debates, all to be held on home grounds.

McNamara Is Given Sentence by Court

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 2.—John J. McNamara, convicted by a jury in the criminal court on a charge of blackmail, was sentenced to the state prison for one to five years and fined \$1,000 and costs Friday by Judge Fred C. Gause, who presided as special judge in the trial.

Judge Gause overruled a motion for a new trial, filed by McNamara's attorneys. Notice was filed of an appeal to the supreme court.

BAIL REDUCED

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—The preliminary hearing of Paul Browaw, termed the collection rump runner, Friday was set for October 9. His bail was reduced from \$20,000 to \$5,000.

Browaw is accused of being a leader of liquor smuggling operations in this section and is charged specifically with connection with the "battle of Massena," a fight between bootleggers and officers which resulted in the death of a deputy sheriff.
