

PITTSBURGH PASSES MUSTER FOR WORLD SERIES REQUISITES

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—A world series is usually played in two phases, the first one occurring in the afternoon within the bounds of a ball yard, the second between the hours of sun-down and set-up in hotel rooms and cozy little resorts in the side streets. The schedule for the first phase are plenty here, balls, macks and mits. Those for the second are poker chips, placeware, and the comforts thereof.

Washington offers very meagre facilities for the celebration of the secondary phase of the world's series, prohibition being rule in the capital.

Prohibition is not so rigid in New York, and a world series can be celebrated there with considerable eclat.

But in Pittsburgh the world series no doubt will be fully observed in both phases, because there is no noticeable prohibition in Pittsburgh.

The local population may or may not participate in the evening rites of the event, but the visiting trade, especially the sporting element, as it is called, always indulges.

Pittsburgh, at a busy place, would seem to be less troubled by the Eighteenth amendment than any other city, including Philadelphia.

It is explained that the beer which flows so liberally in Pittsburgh comes from certain breweries which are privileged to make over-proof for saloons and distill mill workers, who insist on having beer.

One finds a surprisingly large number of white collar miners and steel mill workers insisting on having their beer, and having it in the evening in Pittsburgh. It is very efficacious beer, reminiscent of the time when the trusted stout served certain wicked doctors to all effect advertised the "largest and richest in town for a nickel."

Celebrants going to Pittsburgh to take part in the secondary phase of the world series do not will be interested to know that prohibition is unenforced there, and that the thing may be done without resort to hard liquor, which inflicts great wear and tear on the human apparatus.

Pittsburgh's world series will be the first beer world series since the one in 1915.
