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COMPARATIVE STRENGTH OF WORLD SERIES CONTENDERS

JOE JUDGE
Judge's speed, hitting and fielding give him an edge over both of the Pittsburgh first basemen. He is a dangerous man in a pinch, as his batting mark of .385 in the last world series can testify. He also has a penchant for extra-base hits and garners his share of home runs. His susceptibility to injury is his only weak point.

STANLEY HARRIS
Stanley Harris, Nat's manager and second baseman, has proved himself one of the greatest "money" players in the world. His fielding and hitting in last year's classic were of a superior order, as was his strategy against McGraw. Harris plays with his head as well as his hands. You can always expect Harris to be there in the pinch.

ROGER PECKINPAUGH
Teamed with Stan Harris at second, Peck is just about the greatest defensive shortstop in the majors. The play of each is helped by the confidence he has in the other. He and Harris are the greatest double play combination in baseball. He gets the shade over Wright on the strength of that and his .417 batting mark in last year's series.

OSWEE BLUEGE
He not only has the most peculiar name in baseball but he is the best third sacker in the American league if not the majors. It is no discredit to Traynor, Pirate third sacker, to place him and Bluege on even terms. Bluege's hitting was a problem to Harris for a while, but he has shown marked improvement this year. He is cool, and that counts heavily.

GOOSE GOSLIN
Goose Goslin was the home run hero of the last world series. He should fill the same role this year unless he gets into a slump. As a steady hitter and as an outfielder and base-runner he must yield an edge on Cuyler. However, it would occasion no great surprise if Goose were to break the world series home-run record this year.

EARL MCNEELEY
Earl McNeely suffers in comparison with Max Carey, his rival in center field. McNeely is fast as a streak and a splendid hitter, but Carey is much stronger at the bat and is likely to play heavier ball in the pinches. McNeely is not to be despised in a tight situation, however. He delivered the hit that won the series last year.

SAM RICE
Rice is one of the oldest players in point of service with the Washington club. He is 33, but like Carey, the years have failed to slow him up. He is one of the fastest men on either team and the most consistent hitter with the Nats. He hit only .207 in last year's series, but he figures a little stronger than Barnhart of Pittsburgh.

MUDDY RUEL
Muddy was the best catcher in the majors last year and the year before. This year some press the claims of Cochrane and Hartnett. At any rate, he stacks up stronger than either of his Pittsburgh rivals. He is as good a hitter and a much headier receiver than either. If he is properly rested, he should do much better than he did in last year's series.

WASHINGTON STATE DEFEATS MONTANA

MISSOULA, Mont., Oct. 3.—Washington State college won the first game of the Pacific coast conference football race of 1925, with a victory here today over the University of Montana. The final score was 9 to 0, the result of three field goals. W. Kramer kicked the first boot from placement in the first two minutes of play after a Montana punt had been blocked. He kicked another in the third period, and Capt. Martin kicked the third in the last period. Montana rallied hard in the second half to show to best advantage for the day on offense, making ten first downs against eight. Capt. Hlman led a Montana attack in the third quarter that brought the only chance of the day for a touchdown. Montana took a first down on the five-yard line. With a yard to go on the fourth down Kelly was stopped four inches from the goal line, and the Cougars kicked out of danger.

COMER WINS CLASSIC
FRESNO, Calif., Oct. 3.—Fred Comer, driving Harry Harts' car, won the 150 mile auto classic on the Fresno speedway, after De Palo, the champion, and several other drivers had been forced out by engine trouble. Comer's time was slightly better than 102 miles an hour. Bennett Hill was second and Cairns was third.

GEORGE GRANTHAM
Barring accidents, Grantham will play at first for the Pirates against the Pittsburgh first basemen. EDDIE MOORE
Injury to Rawlings probably means that Eddie Moore, Pittsburgh's regular second sacker, will be back on the keystone instead of cavorting around in the outfield, where he has been playing during Carey's absence. He has had two years of major league ball and has performed brilliantly at bat and in the field. His youth makes him an unknown quantity.

GLENN WRIGHT
Wright, Pirate shortstop, like Moore is a youngster with just two years' experience. This fact, of course, makes the harding of any predictions concerning him a risky piece of business. He is a sweet fielder and a better hitter than Peckinpaugh, although the latter has a well known habit of being at his best in the pinches.

"PIE" TRAYNOR
Here is the best third baseman in the National League. A giant of a fellow and a hard hitter, he is also a brilliant fielding star. Although a youngster in years, he has been through four major league campaigns and can be accounted a veteran in experience. Unless form means nothing, he should be an offensive and defensive star in the series.

HAZEN CUYLER
Cuyler is probably the greatest outfielder to break into the big leagues in the last 10 years. He is one of the leading hitters in the National. He can go after a fly with the best of them. His base-running is matched in his league only by that of Carey. If there is to be any long hitting in the series, Cuyler should do his share.

MAX CAREY
The best base-runner in the National League, a beautiful fielder, Max Carey, Pittsburgh center fielder, is enjoying his best year at the bat since breaking into the big leagues 18 years ago. He is 35, but the years seemingly make little difference in Carey's speed and craft. He is reliability itself. He should turn many a potential hit into an out.

CLYDE BARNHART
Barnhart is a good enough out fielder and a hard hitter, but he suffers in comparison with his teammates, Carey and Cuyler. This year has been his best with the bat. He is a right-handed hitter and may alternate with Carson Bigbee, who is a portender, according to the brand of pitching served. He also may do pinch-hitting duty.

EARL SMITH
Smith's previous world series experience with the Giants should give him the call over Gooch for most of the catching, although there is little to choose between the two otherwise. Both hit at the same figure, although Smith hits them much farther and is a more formidable man in a pinch. He is a left-handed hitter.
