ALTAMONT ACRES PORTER AWARDED BUILDING HOMES LEGION CONTRACT

Home builders of the city are now turning their eyes toward Altamont Acres, in the southern section of city, on which the Wishard Realty company have been making improvements of late in accommodation for those wishing to erect houses for permanent residence or in fulfilling needs caused by a shortage of housing accommodations here.

Altamont acres covers an area of about 60 acres. Street grading has been going on and road work pushed forward rapidly. Water is being put in and city lights ready for installation on completion of buildings.

Several new homes have given that district a start and it is one which will in time, it is said, form one of the most attractive and modest residential districts of the city. Demand for lots in that vicinity has shown a decided upward trend during the past ten days.

COMMUNITY CLUB HOLDS MEETING

The Central Community club met at the Henley school Friday, Oct. 2. The club building program was discussed and all subscribers were asked to turn in their subscriptions by Friday, Oct. 3, so that the building may be finished before bad weather sets in. The money may be paid to either O. Campbell, Henry Semon, Hans Nylander, Dick Bennett or Jim Essel. A building site will be procured from the Klamath county school district on the ten acre tract south of the Henley school. Fred Peterson, county superintendent of schools was instructed to make definite arrangements for the site. The railroad question was also discussed at the meeting and Hans Nylander was elected to represent the club at the hearing at Portland. Sam Dehlinger was chosen as the alternate.

Klamath county court yesterday accepted the bid of Louis K. Porter of the Porter Construction company, for the erection of the American Legion building, bid set at \$22,406.70, the lowest bid to be offered by bidders on the building.

Because the bid was the lowest and because Porter, a member of the American Legion, had offered to do the work on the building at cost, the figures were accepted late yesterday afternoon.

Other bidders were Cofer Brothers, (a) \$25,350, (b) \$25,850; W. A. Stevens & Son, (a) \$25,350, (b) \$25,241, (c) \$27,555, (d) \$26,850; Porter Construction company, (a) \$22,321.70, (b) \$22,552.70, (c) \$24,073.22, (d) \$22,406.70; Klamath Concrete Pipe company, (a) \$25,100, (b) \$24,400, (c) \$28,000, (d) \$27,400.

Certified checks were sent in by all bidders to the county court.

The building which Porter includes in his bid is to be of masonry foundation with stucco finish.

Howard Perrin is architect for the building.
