## Accessory Figures Given By Supply Manager

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## AIR MAIL PILOT IS THOUGHT DEAD

### Scores of Searchers Fail To Find Trace of Missing Man or Machine

BELLEFONTE, Pa., Oct. 5.—As darkness forced the last plane to the ground in the search for Charles Ames, missing New York-Chicago air mail pilot, federal authorities admitted to the local police that the search would be continued only to locate the lost plane and a dead aviator.

At dawn Tuesday a hundred members of troop B, state militia, will join in the search, it was announced here Monday night. The 500 state police, forest rangers and natives of the hills who have been combing the underbrush and mountains for the last few days were joined Monday by several hundred students of Pennsylvania state college.

The buying of hunting dogs mingle with the shrill cries of young children as repeated false alarms of discovery are reported.

Ten planes searched throughout the day, the first time since Ames was missed, that weather conditions were favorable. Searchers on foot continued the hunt after nightfall, joined by scores of natives, whose work during the day kept them from aiding.
