MACMILLAN RADIOS WIFE IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Oct. 8.—(United News)—A record for short waves to shore station reception is believed to have been established by the MacMillan arctic exploration ship, Peary, now in port at Halifax, N. S., on her return from

northern waters. In a message from Commander E. B. McDonald of the Peary to the Zenith Radio corporation Thursday, the information was conveyed that more than 4,000 words were sent and received between 6:15 and 10:45 p. m., Tuesday. The message said Radio Engineer Meinhard sent a radio message to his wife in Chicago which was relayed to her by telephone and the return message sent back to Halifax all within seven minutes.

Asiatics Peopled America Ages Ago

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—(United News)—In the virgin world before the dawn of recorded history nomadic Asiatics, moving eastward across the Kuriles and the Aleutians, peopled the North American continent with oriental blood.

Dr. Edward Sapir, noted Canadian anthropologist now on the faculty of the University of Chicago, discussed the mooted question in an interview Thursday and revealed that this research in linguistics had convinced him that such migrations took place.

Mr. Boschke further testified it was necessary to run a line through the center of the Tule lake farming country, rather than over the original survey through Malin, as the new line, six miles or less from Malin, saved about seven miles of track. The character of soil of the Tule lake country, Mr. Boschke said, is sufficiently substantial to give a good road bed.
