CALIFORNIA GAME ATTRACTS FANS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.—Interest in Saturday's football games on the Pacific coast centers largely in the University of California-Olympic club contest in Berkeley. The clubmen, victors over Stanford two weeks ago, will have a squad of ex-collegians, most of them stars of the first magnitude, in their undergraduate days, with which to assault the Bears, undefeated in five years. The fact that the Olympic club is composed largely of Stanford men means that they will fight their hardest to lower Andy Smith's colors. California is being backed to win, however. In a Pacific coast conference game at Eugene, Idaho will meet Oregon. The Oregon Aggies defeated Gonzaga at Corvallis Friday, 22 to 0. Enoch Bagshaw's Washington Huskies are favored to defeat Montana in another conference game in Seattle, while Coach Howard Jones and his University of Southern California Trojans are expected to trounce Utah under a sizable score. Stanford probably will not have much trouble with Occidental at Palo Alto, the main interest in the game being in the condition of the Cardinals with their tough U. S. C. engagement only a week ahead.
