Dignified Justices of Supreme Court Listen to Daughter of One of Members Argue Case for First Time in History

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 9.—United News—For the first time in its long history, the dignified, black-robed supreme court heard the daughter of one of its members plead a case before it recently.

She was Miss Susan Brandeis, 25-year-old daughter of Justice Brandeis. Her father stepped down from the bench when she took her place before the highest tribunal in the land.

The silence of the supreme court where strict quiet is enforced, was intensified as the serious-faced, olive-skinned young woman began her argument. She presented an appeal to the court in behalf of Joseph P. Margolin, New York lawyer, who was convicted of accepting a fee of more than \$3 in presenting a case to the United States veteran bureau.

She took but fifteen minutes in her argument, presenting merely the legal aspects of the case. Her opposing counsel was "Wild Bill" Donovan, special assistant to the attorney general, who represented the government.

Miss Brandeis wore a dark dress. Her hair is not bobbed, contrary to the prevailing fashion. She is the elder daughter of Justice Brandeis, and was admitted to practice before the supreme court last October. A graduate of Bryn Mawr and the Chicago University Law school, the young woman has been practicing law since 1920, when she was admitted to the New York state bar. From 1921 until last year, Miss Brandeis was special assistant to United States Attorney Hayward of New York, in prosecutions of alleged combinations in the building trades.

Margolin, for whom Miss Brandeis appeared, claimed he had incurred heavy expenses in trips from New York to the veterans' bureau in presenting his case, and that congress had never intended its law to prevent a lawyer from getting more than \$3 for his services.

SPORTS DONE BROWN

The death of good male tennis players in England at the present time is indicated clearly by the recent rating of A. Wallie Myers, noted British net authority.

Myers finds it impossible in his list to place any British player in the list of the first ten in the men's ranks. The United States, France, Australia, Spain and Japan are represented—placing all of these countries ahead of the British Isles.

Tilden, Johnson and Richards of the American stars, lead the first ten in the order named. Rene La Costa, dashing French star, is given fourth place. R. Norris Williams, fourth member of this year's Davis Cup defenders, is placed fifth. La Costa's teammate, Jean Borotra, comes next in Myers' opinion. Gerald Patterson of Australia, one of the members of the Davis Cup team which fell before the French assault, is placed seventh; Manuel Alonso of Spain, eighth; Brian Norton, representing the United States is ninth, and Takeichi Harada of Japan brings up the rear.

Myers' rating of the women stars is also interesting. In the first ten of the feminine list, however, three representatives of England appear. Elizabeth Ryan, who returned to the United States after 13 years in England, is listed as an American.

He gives Mile, Suzanne Lenglen first place. Miss Helen Willis, United States champion, is placed second, a logical choice. Next comes Kathleen McKane, rising young British star. Miss Ryan is placed fourth; Mrs. Molla Mallory, United States, is ranked fifth; Miss Eleanor Goss, United States, is next; Mrs. Lambert Chambers, veteran British player, is seventh; Miss Joan Fry of England, eighth; Mile, Billout, France, is ninth, and Mrs. Marion Jessup, United States, tenth.

Stuffy McInnis and Everett Scott will bank their sixth world's series check this fall.

What's more to the point, both of them are in the line of the Pittsburgh park, back in 1909, showed that 145,295 fans had paid their way into that fall series baseball magnates believed the end had been reached in attendance figures, and the resultant receipts, which amounted to \$188,302.

The members of the winning Pirate team split \$40,184 and the losing Tigers \$26,769.

Last year 282,665 persons paid their respective ways into the games the Giants and Senators played, and the receipts totaled \$1,093,104. The players of the two teams split a total of \$381,092—practically twice as much as the total amount taken in at the 1909 series. The advisory council of the major leagues received \$163,965 as its share—almost as much as the total receipts reached in the series of 16 years ago.

Which indicates as clearly as anything else connected with the conduct of the games how baseball has grown as a business venture.

Among them are "Costs and Profits from Sheep on Irrigated Farms," "Tree Borers," "Apple Orchard Cultivation," "Control of Wheat Smut and Bunt in Eastern Oregon," "Hungarian Vetch and Its Uses," while a full line of United States department of agriculture bulletins are kept on hand for aid in the various lines of farm endeavor practiced in this county.

Many of these bulletins contain plans for building various farm structures, such as chicken houses, coops, rabbit hutches, dairy barns and milking barns, hog and sheep houses and shelters, beside a multitude of small improvements, such as troughs of various sorts and for different purposes, potato bins and storage houses, sewer systems for the farm and septic tanks, silos, etc. Many of them furnish with these plans estimates of cost and other interesting and helpful data for the farmer.
