An interesting paper written by Mrs. Rachael Applegate Solomon and reviewed by Mrs. Wilbur Jones gave a complete discussion of the 3 generations in which our mother, grandmother and great-grandmother kept their homes.

The first of a series of three tableaux found Mrs. Carey Ramsby in powdered wig and quaint cut frock spinning at a wheel. By her side stood Miss Betty Jane Brown in blue frock, pantelettes and poke bonnet. In the background, carrying out in exact detail the scene, were such familiar articles in the grandmother's home as candle molds, the huge family bible, odd tintype photographs and a homespun rug. A sampler with the name of Emily Jane Phillips completed the room.

The second scene opened upon Mrs. R. A. Emmitt in a mid-Victorian home, where she fitted well with her frock of gray taffeta and hand embroidered petticoat. This character study was directed by Mrs. Harry Ackley and depicted the era of the entrance of modernism when "father began to buy his clothes from the store and food was cooked on a cast iron range." A music box, the property of Mrs. Calkins, fulfilled the remainder of the scene snatching from minds any modern strain that might remain.

Mrs. Charles Martin directed the third tableaux, and the screens parted upon a dazzling scene of modernism, lighted candles on tea tables, floor lamps, wall plaques and mirrors. Mrs. S. E. Martin, Mrs. Mary Moore and Mrs. Merle West were the characters in this scene, in direct contrast in their frocks of 1925 with those of their mother and grandmother.

Interspersed between the depicting scenes were interesting bits of music, for the colonial period Padreswaki's Minuet, played by Mrs. Russell Austin; violin solos by Max Brown, pupil of Harry Borel, and vocal solo by Mrs. C. R. Lucas accompanied by Mrs. Don Zumwalt.
