Army Pilot Drives Plane At Rate of 248.99, Winning Pulitzer Prize

MITCHELL FIELD, L. I., Oct. 12.—(United News)—Two bullets of canvas, wood and steel streaked through the gold of an October sky Monday in the fastest of the speed classics, the Pulitzer airplane race, which was won by Lieut. Cyrus Bettis of the army at the record speed of 248.99 miles an hour.

To surpass the existing mark for a closed course of an 121.27 miles, Bettis had to defeat Lieut. Alford J. Williams, the crack pilot, who attained 244.78 miles in St. Louis in 1924. Williams, the man whose plane recently hit 302.3 miles an hour in a straight-away burst of speed, which was faster than anything built by man had ever traveled before, could only average 241.71 in the circling course of four laps.

The winner took off two minutes behind Williams. Several miles apart they roared over the field, while a great holiday crowd sat below as word spread that air history was being made by the army pilot.

As the race ended, Bettis immediately brought his plane to the ground while his defeated opponent, the hero of many an aerial battle, seemed to be laughing off his loss in a brief series of uttana. Lieut. G. T. Cuddihy, navy; Lieut. H. J. Norton, navy; Capt. H. W. Cook, army and Lieut. L. H. Dawson, army, were contestants in another heat for the Pulitzer trophy, but their speed fell well behind that of the other two.

Lieut. Thomas K. Matthews, Iowa, won the 120 mile speed contest for the John L. Mitchell trophy, with an average speed of 161.7 miles an hour. Lieut. George Schuglin finished second at 155.6, with Lieut. Alfred J. Lyon third at 155.4.

All winners of the Mitchell race are members of the first pursuit group at Selfridge field, Mount Clemens, Mich.

ASTORIA TORNADO WINS TECH. KAY-O

POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(United News)—Paul Berlenbach, the Astoria assassin, who temporarily holds the light heavyweight championship of the world, administered such a trouncing to King Solomon of Panama in their ten round bout here Monday afternoon that the referee stopped the fight in the ninth and Berlenbach won by a technical knockout.

It was Berlenbach's fight from the clang of the opening gong, and only Solomon's gameness kept him in the ring through eight rounds and 31 seconds of the end of the ninth round. Several times the Central American was so dazed by the sledge hammer blows of the champion that he could not find his corner at the round's end.

Sid Terris won the decision from Jack Bernstein in a milling 10-round semi-final, but both of the leading bouts yielded in thrills to the preliminary 10 round go between Babe Herman, the California flash, and Joe Calmares, a Bronx youth, substituted at the last moment, when Johnny Dundee, Herman's scheduled opponent, was reported ill at his home.

The unknown Calmares fought to a standstill the man, who recently was credited with winning from Kid Kaplan, the featherweight title holder, although he lost the decision of the judges.

The Bronx battler made up for what he lacked in ring skill by a stout heart, which sent him crashing into Herman throughout the fight. The judges called it a draw, but the crowd was on its feet hailing Calmares as the victor.

Vic, as Ruel singled and Bleuge doubled after Joe, but Aldridge pulled out of the hole. Both of the Pirate runs, up to this stage of the battle, were scored. (Continued on Page Five)

Aldridge had been the victim of a break, giving the Senators their first run in the first inning. After Rice opened with a single and was sacrificed to second, Goslin sliced a pop fly just beyond Wright's reach, and, since Barnhart was playing deep, it fell safe for two bases.

The Pirates early began slugging. Coveloskie's pitches back to the outfield. It became a question of when these drives would start hitting the open spaces.

There were two safe hits by Carey and Cuyler, in the opening inning, but Bucky Hargis prevented a run when he turned in a great play on Wright's drive, which Carey's glove deflected.

Two more singles came in the fourth and Judge, whose southpaw fielding around first is a feature of the Senators' infield spiked the rally with one of the greatest plays of the series. Early Smith, who also had wasted a single in the second, lined another to right and Moore smashed one to center. Max Carey, the Charley Paddock of baseball, was at bat and Judge played in expecting a bunt. Max drove a hard grounder down first base line, but Judge sprang back, knocking down the ball, then crawled to the bag barely in time for the put out.

The lid popped off the battle in the seventh. First a walk, for Eddie Moore, the Bucs' second baseman, who seems at last to hit his stride, then six, six, six, three sharp singles in a row, from the bats of Carey, Cuyler and Barnhart—for two runs.

Harold Ruel, prevented further scoring by outwitting the Pirates on an attempted double steal, when he called for pitchout and trapped Cuyler off third.

Manager Harris began pulling strategic strings, as Covey made his exit after that hitting spree. He sent Win Ballou, a green rookie, to the mound to finish the seventh. Win fanned Pie Traynor for the third out. Then Bucky made his offensive bid as his club went to bat. He sent Nemo Leibold the veteran midget flyhawk to pinch hit for Ballou, and Nemo came through with a line double to right. Rice followed with a single and one of the runs came back to the Senators. But again Aldridge tightened up in the pinch, pitching to Joe Harris.

That ended the Senators' offensive work for the day. But the Pirates were not through, although they had the game already in the bag. They stepped out and demonstrated to Stanley Harris that this gossip about them hitting left handed pitching is no gas. They slammed Tom Zachary's southpaw shoots around in the closing two innings for four real hits and two more runs.

Wright and McInnis, the first two batters to face Zachary who last fall won two games from the Giants, sent out line singles for a run in the 8th. Then Traynor and Wright singled, after Barnhart had walked, for the other run in the ninth.

Ossie Bleuge was back on third for the Senators. On two fielding chances, he didn't look very good. Cuyler's single in the seventh got away from Ossie and Wright's hit in the ninth went through him. But the Washington third baseman proved he isn't exactly "ball shy" after being beamed by Aldridge in Pittsburgh last Thursday, when he hit a timely double in the fourth and when he fielded Aldridge's hot grounder into a fast double play in the second inning.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Walter Johnson pitched invincible ball here yesterday, shutting out Pittsburgh with a score of 4 to 0. Elmer Yde, Pirate southpaw, was hit hard. Goslin slammed a homer into the left field bleachers, scoring Bucky Harris and Sam Rice. Joe Harris then stepped up and smashed another into the same bleachers.
