Klamath Falls soon is to have its state highway shops and storage buildings, according to word received yesterday by the local branch of the state highway department.

Bids, it was learned yesterday, are to be opened in Portland October 27.

The structures are expected to cost from between \$10,000 to \$20,000.

The buildings, it was explained, will be erected at the north end of the Altamont acres, across the tracks from the Klamath Moulding company.

The dimensions of the structures will be 34x68 feet, and 58x96 feet, respectively.

Persons interested in the move for the new buildings declare that Klamath Falls and vicinity long have needed the facilities to be afforded.

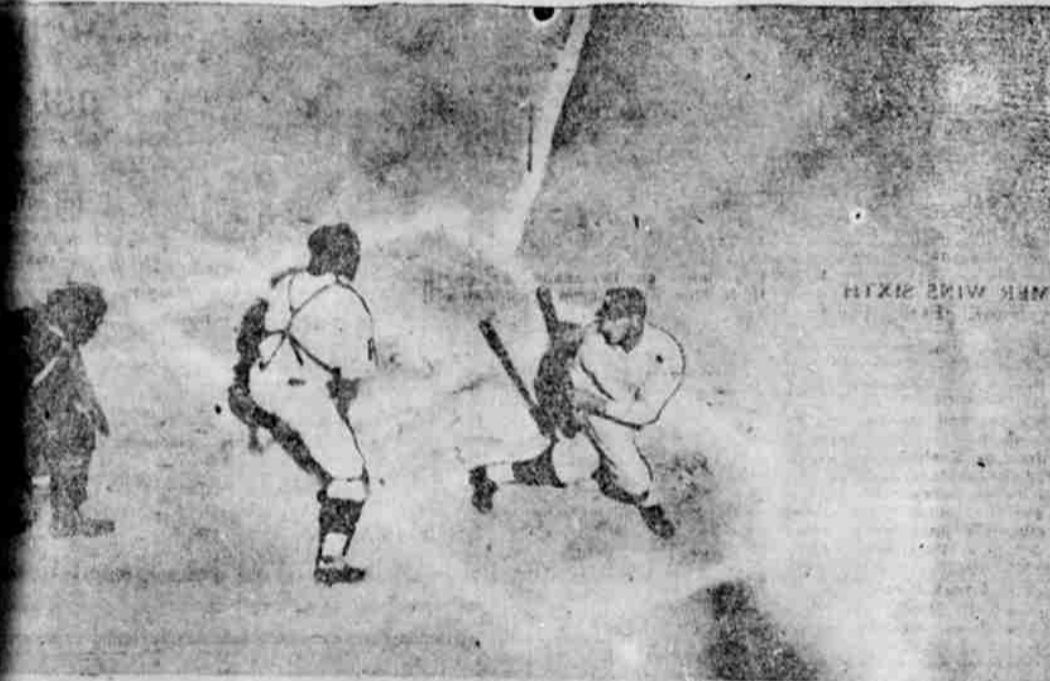
## New War Secretary May Arrest Mitchell
