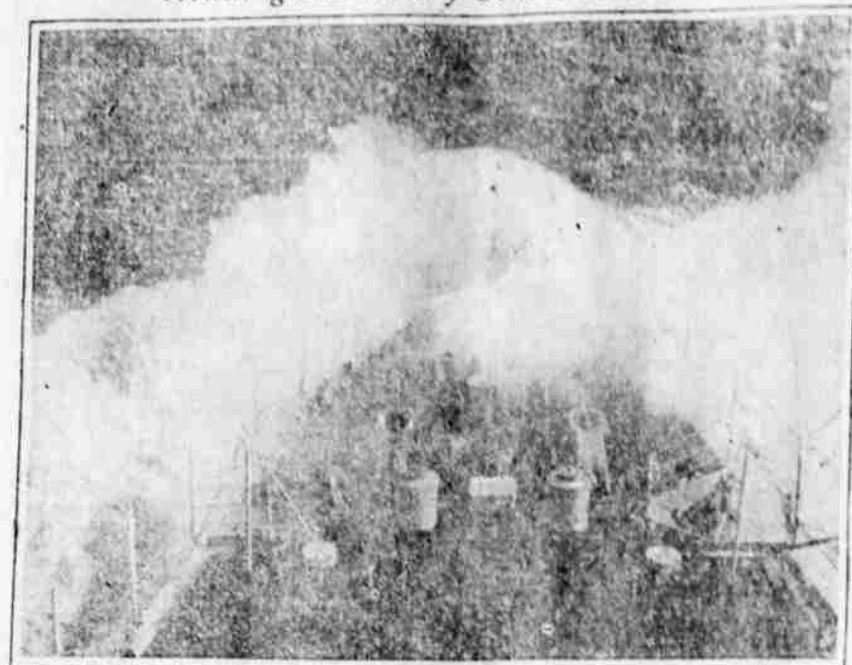


LOCALS

Rhineland Pact Is Held Dove of Peace

LOCARNO, Oct. 15. (United News)—Real peace has come to Europe. The security conference, adopted the final text of the Rhineland pact Thursday, and the four other interlocking treaties now being negotiated are virtually assured of adoption. It is planned to submit all five documents to the conference Saturday to be initiated preliminary to their dispatch to the respective capitals where they will be passed upon by cabinets and parliaments.

With these facts established it may be said literally that the war has ended after eleven years of military or economic turmoil in the old world. Only a reversal such as smote the treaty of Versailles, when the United States senate refused to ratify it, can now defeat the work of peace.

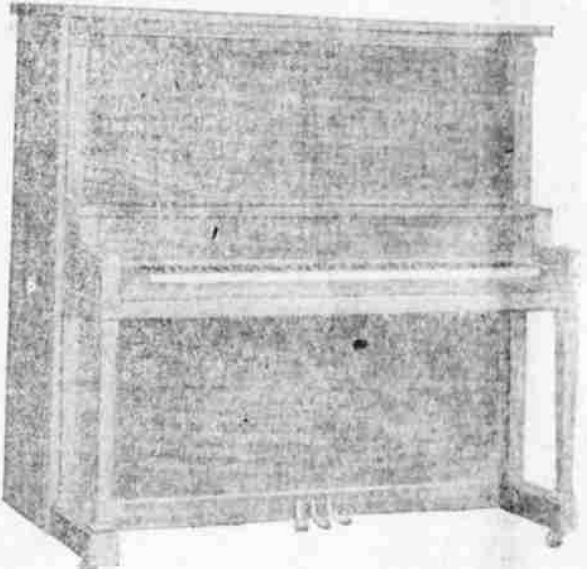

AIRCRAFT BOARDS ATTACK MITCHELL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—(United News)—The American aircraft industry, attacked for alleged failure to keep up with aviation progress, came to its own defense Thursday before the president's special aircraft inquiry board.

The industry, its representatives declared, was not inefficient and obsolete, as has been charged, but was away ahead of the aviation industry of any other country.

Pointing out that since the beginning of heavier than air craft, the United States had steadily maintained the lead in the tremendous advances made in aviation. Witnesses in turn bitterly charged that after doing everything possible for its betterment, the industry was suffering badly from the attacks aimed at it by Col. Mitchell.
