

FIGHT CARD IS SHAPING UP WELL

Battlers Due to Fight Oct. 20 Attracting Crowd During Daily Work-Outs

Everything is shaping up well for the boxing card scheduled for Scandinavian hall on October 20, under management of Johnnie Sylvester, whom the commission has recently secured for Klamath Falls. Sylvester spent some time in picking out a card which gives promise of being a cooker.

The schedule of events is as follows: Main event 10 rounds, De Pinto, Portland, vs. Kid Starkey of Klamath Falls; six round, semi-wind-up, Chuck Sams, of Klamath Falls, vs. Earl Stolz of Bend; special event, four rounds or better, Kid Alzona vs. W. Harrington, Chiloquin Indian fighter.

All of these boys are looking up well and are working out each afternoon and evening. De Pinto has not arrived yet, but in that he is believed to be acting on the advice of his manager. It is no mean proposition for a fighter to change climate, especially from a low altitude like the coast to a height of 4,400 feet like Klamath Falls.

With Stolz, who came here from Bend, it was different. There is only about six hundred feet variance in the altitude of Bend and Klamath Falls, which is a lot different than 4,400 feet.

De Pinto knows his oats, and very likely, is following out the theory of old-time managers that it is better to either come to higher altitude in time to get acclimated, or wait until the last minute so that the climate does not have a chance to get in its dirty work.

This is one fight in which fate has been kind to Earl Stolz. He can eat. Earl can look a waitress square in the eye and order a porterhouse, or a whole cow if he wants to, without having to lift a fist look over his shoulder to watch an eagle-eyed manager or promoter is piping him off with a watchful eye to the ring-side weight. This is because Earl is giving Chuck, or rather took him on at five or six pounds difference, so he can have a good square meal up to five pounds worth if he wants to. But as with all athletes, squared rims, gloves, shavers and gentlemen who earn their living by shining leather on the back of a banjoist with the seat of their pants, eating heartily has its drawbacks. With Earl it is the same, taking on five pounds for his fight with Chuck means taking it off by the time he steps into the ring to fight the Black Panther in Bend on October 24.
