During the year when she and her husband might have celebrated their silver wedding anniversary, Nettie Crapser, of Klamath Falls, chose to beat her husband over the head with a stove poker, according to his divorce complaint, yesterday filed with Lloyd Delap, clerk of the circuit court.

In fact, according to the allegation of Mr. Crapser, Mrs. Crapser has caused him much anguish. Mrs. Crapser, he charges, has threatened to "get him out of the road" that she may "get what little property he has accumulated." The defendant is 55 years of age, and his wife is 39.

Mr. Crapser, he complains, has been "repeatedly assaulted and beaten up and, he charges, his wife has threatened to kill him.

He has petitioned the court for a divorce and for custody of the minor children.

Yesterday Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt issued an order restraining Mrs. Crapser from interfering with her husband or his property.

## 200 PASSENGERS RESCUED AT SEA

### Clyde Liner Catches Afire Off Florida Coast, Is Abandoned By Crew

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 17. (United Press)—Two hundred passengers and members of the crew of the Clyde liner Comanche were safely removed from the vessel tonight when fire which broke out in the engine room threatened to destroy the ship.

Responding to radio signals of distress of the Texas Oil company tanker, the F. L. Reaper raced to the scene and removed the passengers. The captain then ordered the ship abandoned as the fire gained headway.

The passengers and the crew left the ship without any disorder.

Several fire fighting tugs responded from Jacksonville and were attempting to save the vessel from total destruction.

The fire was discovered about 12 miles off Mayport, Fla. The ship was bound for the north and comparatively few passengers were on board.

## Phone Service Is O. K. at Courthouse

Yesterday evening at 8 o'clock it was possible to raise the receiver on any of the 13 telephones in the Klamath county courthouse and, subsequently, be greeted with the customary, "Number, please."

Previous to that time Lester Ijams, cable splicer for the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, had been at work for five hours preparing a permanent conduit in which to run the wires to the court house.

In the morning Ray Dunn, manager of the local office, had arranged temporary service, but it was necessary to disrupt it in order to install the permanent lines.

The lines to the court house were inadvertently severed by a laborer employed in the construction of the American Legion Mem-

orial building at the corner of Fourth and Klamath streets. Ijams was rushed to Klamath Falls to attend to the conduit. His headquarters are at Eugene.

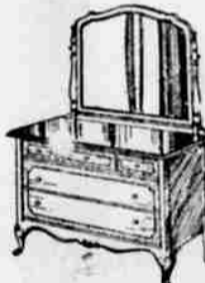
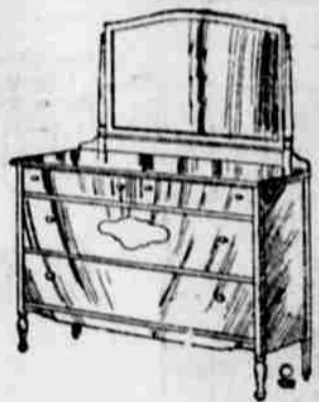
