fight, and the boys came back strong
in their last quarter of play. Un-
able to stand the onslaught of the
heavier team, they were again push-
ed back into enemy territory, and
a touchdown was again scored by
Medford. They failed to convert,
leaving the score standing 23 to 0.

Medford kicked off, Klamath
returned the ball, with Barnes
for 25 yards after he
saw the pigskin from the
line of scrimmage. The
first down sent them 10
yards toward their goal,
Barnes holding the ball, fol-
lowing two successful gains, five
yards each. On the fourth down,
Medford punting, with Medford run-
ning back but a few feet, leaving
Klamath's 20-yard line.

Mike De Pinto, game Italian light-
weight battler, arrived in Klamath
Falls yesterday, preparatory to his
coming fight with "Kid" Starkey,
in the main event of the boxing card
to be staged here on Tuesday night
by Matchmaker Johnnie Sylvester.
This makes the last of the entire
repertoire of boxers to appear on
October 20 in the Scandinavian hall,
to arrive in town, and everything is
now set for what is believed to be
the best gathering of squared ring
artists seen here in many a day.

As an additional feature Match-
maker Sylvester has added another
four-round preliminary to the other
three. Jack Crim and "Kid" Sul-
livan will go on for four rounds. In
all there will now be twenty-four
rounds of going for the fans.

De Pinto, on arriving in the city
yesterday, certainly looked in fine
condition. He said he was feeling
that way, and would have been
here sooner only for the altitude re-
sulting in his being advised to stave
off his arrival as late as possible.

De Pinto is a game little fighter,
and gives everything he has got.
Starkey, the Klamath Falls boy,
is reported to be in good fighting
trim, also. Starkey knows he will
have to go to get anywhere with the
little Portland lightweight. Naturally
Starkey wants to win, but whether
or not he wins, the lad is especially
desirous of putting up a good show-
ing. It is battles of this kind that
sends a man a notch or two up the
ladder, and Starkey is ready to do
some climbing if everything breaks
well for him.

In the six-round semi-windup
event between Earl Stolz, of Bend
and Chuck Sams, of Klamath Falls,
there will be a battle well worth
any man's coin to see. Both men
have been getting busy, each in his
respective manner for this bout.
Stolz, a little lighter than his oppo-
nent, has been taking on weight, and
cutting down some of the harder
training, while Sams has had to
work to keep from getting any heav-
ier. Matchmaker Sylvester refused
to allow any very great difference
in weight, as he is experienced and
wise in this game, and is determin-
ed to give the fans as evenly match-
ed performances as is within his
power.

Next to the semi-windup will be
a four-round go between W. Har-
rington, the Chiloquin Indian, and
Young Alcorn, the Kay-O Kid, both
of whom are known in these parts,
and are reputed to be there when it
comes to shoving leather. Jack
Crim and Kid Sullivan, to meet for
four rounds, makes up the entire
card.

The first preliminary will start
promptly at 8:30 o'clock. As there
are four events on the card, this
will give the entire program of the
evening plenty of time to wind up
at a reasonable hour.

Matchmaker Sylvester has spent
a busy week. He has been improv-
ing the Scandinavian hall, having it
cleaned up and put in shape for the
boxing events. For one thing the
ring has been made smaller. Here-
tofore the squared arena was 24
feet, but now has been cut down to
a size that will make the battlers
step lively, and nobody will have to
say please.

U. S. CALIFORNIA
LOSE TO CARDS

First Victory of Stanford
Over Mighty Trojans Is
Won 13 to 9

COLISEUM, LOS ANGELES,
Oct. 17.—Crafty Glenn Warner's
mighty Cardinals fought to victory
over the powerful University of
Southern California team in a sen-
sational gridiron struggle here this
afternoon, winning by a score of
13 to 9.

It was Stanford's first victory
over Southern California.

The Cardinal contingent, 15,000
strong, went wild with joy. They
crowded on the field and carried
the victors to their lockers.

A capacity crowd of 80,000 saw
the Trojans humbled for the first
time in their traditional rivalry from
the north. The husky northerners
completely outfought and outguess-
ed the Trojan warriors during the
first half of the contest. Southern
California's vaunted aerial attack
failed to function under Stanford's
defensive strategy, and Coach How-
ard Jones sent in substitute after
substitute in vain.
