principles. I believe I had a right to the expression of those opinions which caused my arrest. I would do the same thing again.

"I believed I was acting under protection of the constitution, but will make the best of it."

Miss Whitney's offense was membership in Oakland branch of the communist party of California, and attendance at an organization meeting of that party. She was convicted in the Alameda county courts, after it had been charged that the group to which she belonged had expressed sympathy for certain acts of the I. W. W. and that it endorsed the Russian "third international."

In defense, Miss Whitney's counsel argued, that as head of a committee she had opposed the use of force in bringing about reforms, and had urged resort to legal action.

The woman's conviction carried an indefinite penitentiary term of from 1 to 14 years. At that time Miss Whitney was secretary of Oakland's associated charities, president of the college suffrage league, the California civic league, and vice-president of the national women's suffrage association.

Attorneys who have carried on Miss Whitney's appeal, do not believe their case entirely lost. It was intimated that a motion might be made to re-open the hearing by the supreme court for a reconsideration of the matter of jurisdiction.

Nearly 100 members of the I. W. W. now are serving terms in California prisons for violation of the criminal syndicalism law.

be released for tax reduction.

The secretary of the treasury advanced a scale of normal rates as follows:

One per cent on incomes up to \$2,000.

Three per cent on the next \$4,000.

Five per cent above \$7,000.

Present rates are 2 per cent up to \$4,000; 4 per cent on \$4,000 to \$5,000 and six per cent above.

The reason is not as substantial as these figures indicate for incomes for \$5,000 and under, however, it would be offset under the plan by repeal of the present provision, allowing a 25 per cent deduction of taxable income for incomes of \$5,000 and below.

Under this provision in the present law 25 per cent is deducted from the taxable income after other deductions have been made, which affords a small additional cut that will be eliminated under Mellon's new plan.

Mellon recommended a tax reduction between \$250,000,000 and \$300,000,000, based on an estimated surplus this year of \$290,000,000. Reductions as high as \$600,000,000 have been suggested by members of congress.

Other recommendations made by Mellon, outside of the normal rate reductions proposed are:

1.—Reduction of surtaxes from the present maximum of 40 per cent on incomes of \$200,000,000 to 20 per cent on incomes of \$150,000,000. The tax begins at one per cent on incomes of \$12,000 and graduates.

2.—Repeal of the estate tax, but suggested as alternative, in view of congressional opposition to a reduction this year and abolition the following.

3.—Repeal of the publicity provision of the income tax law.

4.—Repeal of the gift tax, and several miscellaneous taxes, but retention of the tax on admissions and dues.

5.—Retention of taxes on automobiles, with abolition, if congress desires, of the tax on trucks, tires and accessories. The automobile tax brought in \$125,000,000 last year, of which \$90,000,000 was for automobiles and the other for trucks, tires and accessories.

6.—A constitutional amendment to abolish tax-exempt securities.

7.—Increase in membership of the board of tax appeals to 16 members, in view of added burden.

There was a tense air of expectancy as Chairman Green, of the committee, called on the Secretary of the Treasury. Mellon stood before the committee and read his statement in a low tone. There was a fairly full attendance in the room, which is just above that occupied for several weeks by the president's aircraft board.

Mellon was accompanied by Under Secretary of the Treasury Winston, solicitor of the internal revenue bureau, Alex W. Gregg, youthful tax expert, John McCoy, treasury actuary, who makes the government's estimates and other ex-

bership in the league of nations early in December.

4. League council meeting to summon the assembly in extraordinary session.

5. Assembly meeting in mid-December to admit Germany as a full-fledged member of the league of nations before Christmas.

6. Ratification of the pacts by the various parliaments early in the next year.

7. Exchange of ratifications where upon the work at Locarno would become favorable.

8-9. Treaties between France and Poland and Czechoslovakia, guaranteeing French protection to the latter nations in the event Germany should violate her arbitration treaties with them.

The Rhineland pact briefly guarantees the inviolability of Germany's present western frontier: binds France, Belgium and Germany not to attack each other, and pledges Britain and Italy to intervene against an aggressor who breaks the agreement.

After an introductory paragraph, taking note of the abrogation of treaties neutralizing Belgium, setting forth the popular desire for security, the necessity for ensuring peace in western Europe, and the

"sincere desire of giving all guarantees supplementary guarantees within the frame work of the league of nations covenant, and of the treaties between them."

The framers of the Rhineland pact state that they determined to conclude a treaty with these objects in view.
