KLAMATH FALLS COMES TO FORE

Contracts Let For Highway Work Include Sections In This County

PORTLAND, Oct. 27.—Bids were opened today by the state highway commission on several important pieces of highway work...

Among the most important of which were for grading the Lapine-Corral Springs section of the Dalles-California highway.

Fourteen bids were submitted for this work, the two lowest bids apparently being those of John Hampshire for \$203,760 and Carl Wyberg for \$203,000.

Bids were for broken stone surfacing of 28.2 miles of highway, divided into two sections. The bids for the two sections were submitted by the low bidders as follows:

John Hampshire: North unit, \$160,310; south unit, \$43,450; total, \$203,760.

Carl Wyberg: North unit, \$161,250; south unit, \$41,750; the total of the two bids would be \$203,000 but Wyberg offered a \$8,000 reduction if he obtained both contracts or \$203,000.

Judge Sawyer of Bend also asked that a location be made soon for the central Oregon highway between Bend and Burns in the Glass Butte section.

He asked for a new survey of the Dalles-California highway several miles south of Bend, which is now crooked and rough.

Sawyer also requested that the commission oil the newly completed MacAdam from Lava Butte to Lapine.

In preparation for the completion of the Lakeview-Klamath Falls highway next year the commission also received bids for clearing the Beatty-Drews valley section, a distance of 14.5 miles.

Proposals were also opened for the construction of four frame buildings at Coquille and Klamath Falls for shop and storage purposes.

GENEVA, Oct. 27.—Neither notifications of the alleged French destruction of Damascus or protest against it has been received by the league of nations' permanent mandates commission which now is in session.
