### COOK FASTS EIGHTEEN DAYS WHILE DISHING UP STEAKS 'N PIES FOR MEN

PLANTON, Oct. 28.—The name of this place, he it known, was bestowed upon it by the passenger department of the Southern Pacific. It should further be known, because the world has not heretofore been served with news dispatches emanating from Planton, that it is situated just this side of the tunnel that pierces the peak of the Cascades at Odell pass; and still farther, that it is located at the upper end of Odell lake.

### WOMAN'S CORPSE FOUND IN CELLAR

### Charred Body Discovered By Janitor Buried Under Pile of Coal

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 28.—United News—Burned and mutilated beyond recognition the body of a woman was found here Wednesday buried beneath a coal pile in the basement of Salvation Army headquarters.

The only clue police have is a pair of charred shoes, found by a watchman shoveling the coal. He reported the find and continued shoveling disclosing the corpse.

Reconstructing the crime, police believe the woman was hacked to death, thrust into the furnace, and when the flames failed to consume her, buried in the coal.

The murder was a complete mystery to the coroner's jury, who reported the woman met her death at the hands of person or persons unknown.

### KLAMATH COUNTY CONTRACTS GIVEN

PORTLAND, Oct. 28.—(United News)—Highway contracts amounting to nearly \$500,000 were awarded today by the commission. Low bidders were successful in all cases. The bids were opened at Tuesday's session of the commission.

Most costly of the jobs is that on a section of The Dalles-California road to cost \$203,000.

Klamath and Lake counties—Bly-Drews valley section, Lakeview-Klamath Falls highway, clearing 14.5 miles, Iver J. Roosten, \$8,500.

Klamath county—Two frame buildings for shop and storage purposes at Klamath Falls, Olds Construction company, \$11,554.

The next meeting of the commission will be December 8. The commissioner left this afternoon for Elkton, Douglas county, to hold a public hearing Thursday on the proposed boundaries of a highway improvement district which is being formed to improve the Drain Reedsport road and the Douglas county section of the Roosevelt highway between Reedsport and the Coos county line.

### POISON OF DEAD DUCKS TRACED TO STAGNANT WATER

### Federal Official To Continue Probe

### ORIGINATES IN NORTH

### Definite Tracing to Start At Once By Government Game Officials

Believing that the strange malady which has resulted in the death of thousands of migratory wild birds in the Tule lake lands originates in northern and central Oregon and even as far north as Canada, Dr. Rudolph Snyder, member of the federal bureau of animal industry and George Tonkin, United States game warden, for the district of California, arrived in the city last night to make a thorough investigation of the birds and the origination of the disease.

"We have thrown away both theories of death by botulism and alkali and firmly believe that the malady originated in the north, as far as Canada perhaps, and the first thought that the disease found origin in Tule lake has been discredited," said Tonkin last night.

"Birds by the scores, although not as heavy as in Tule lake are dying in Sacramento and we have found that wherever a large number of stagnant ponds are found, the heavier is the death rate among the birds as the infected water has no chance to clarify itself.

Definite tracing of the migration of the birds will begin by Dr. Snyder and Tonkin tomorrow, according to the latter, in order to trace the flight of the birds and locate if possible the source of the disease.

"Of the 30 ducks which were placed in the Copco pond for study, all but five have survived and these will be kept if possible until the close of duck season and turned loose. Each bird has a government band and a number tied to its leg and next season their migration may easily be traced," said Tonkin.

Dr. Snyder and Tonkin will remain for a week or ten days in the Klamath country tracing the malady as clearly as possible.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—(United News)—Eight beautiful, jeweled and expensively kowned women were arrested in a little Monte Carlo on the fashionable north side here Wednesday.

Police said they were betting on horse races and playing roulette. All said they were married and gave addresses indicating their homes were in wealthy residential districts.

Donning their fur coats, the ladies rode to a police station in a patrol wagon where they took the necessary fifty dollar bonds from their beaded bags and silver purses, called their chauffeurs and departed.

Members of the raiding squad said the gambling palace was richly furnished in velvet hangings and period furniture.

### SOUTH DAKOTA IS SHEATHED IN ICE

### Fourteen Below Is Weather In Mid-West Accompanied By Deep Snow and Ice

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—(United News)—Deep snow, and temperature ranging as low as 14 degrees below zero have brought gladness to the hearts of the kids of the midwest and serious thoughts of heavy clothing and fuel bills to the minds of their parents.

Sleds and skates came out of summer quarters in half a dozen states in this part of the country Wednesday as the unseasonable wave of cold showed more signs of growing worse than of abating into usual October weather.

The earliest freeze in the history of the upper Mississippi valley made skating good at Little Falls, Minn. Coasting parties came into vogue over night in Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin, parts of Indiana, the Dakotas and Illinois.

Ice clad streets added to the hazards of motoring in the cities, but railroads generally were able to follow their regular time schedules.

At Valentino, Neb., the thermometer dropped to 4 degrees below zero. Rapid City, S. D., was the coldest spot in the United States with a temperature of 14 below.

Except along the western shore of Lake Michigan storm warnings were displayed on the great lakes. The north wind that swept this area carried the cold into Ohio and Michigan two states not included in the storm area heretofore.

Although some reaction set in Wednesday night the weather bureau here predicted abnormally low temperatures would prevail throughout its forecast area Thursday.

Clear skies and moderate temperatures are in prospect for Saturday's football games, the weather bureau believes.

### 10,000 Troops Are Sent to Damascus

PARIS, Oct. 28.—Ten thousand fresh troops have been sent to reinforce the 10,000 already in Syria, the foreign office announces. Other operations in the area have been in suspension to permit concentration of troops for the defense of Damascus.

The foreign office explains the shelling of the Christian quarter of the city October 18-20 as a necessity to prevent mobs of Arabs, Druses and communists from capturing the citadel where 10,000 troops could have been trapped, leaving the city defenseless.

### Hoze Stolen From Sheriff

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28.—United News—Efforts are being made by the Sheriff's office here to discover who stole 12 quarts of liquor from an office locker.

The missing booze was being held as evidence against bootleggers.

### SECOND WARD GIVES FORMER POLICE CHIEF 83 VOTES OVER SMITH-LYLE

### Two Losing Candidates Break Even With Total of 133 Each—Ballot Held to Be Heavy Turning Out For Minor Issue

Following a heavy vote, said to be greater than any ballot cast for a one-issue election in many a year, Z. J. Powell, of this city, was yesterday elected councilman for the second ward, by a plurality of 83 votes.

Final returns gave Powell 218, Smith 133, Lyle 133.

It was estimated that fully half of the eligible voters of the ward went to the polls yesterday. Indications that the balloting would be heavy became clear during the last day or two before election day. The ward turned out a total of 133 votes which is more than was expected by many of the old time politicians.

As was predicted, a large portion of the voting was done by women of the ward. During the earlier part of the day the women were more in evidence than men, the latter voting in desultory fashion until the evening hours drew on, when the vote was swelled considerably in proportion to the mid-afternoon.

According to figures of city officials, there are approximately 800 eligible voters in the ward, leaving a total of more than 300 who did not turn out to cast their ballot, being indifferent to the issue.

Precinct No. 4 cast the heaviest vote of all. The polling place for this precinct on 7th street being more centrally located in the constituency. The vote in this precinct totalled 201, with No. 3 second and No. 2 last.

### PACIFIC COAST GUNMAN SHOOTS RESIDENT AND WOUNDS POLICE OFFICER IN THRILLING ESCAPE

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—(United News)—Martin J. Durkin, Pacific coast automobile thief and gunman, staged a spectacular escape from a house here late tonight, after he had been surprised and cornered by a squad of police.

Durkin shot and fatally wounded Lloyd Austin, owner of the house in which he was trapped and also wounded Sergeant A. Grey, one of the police officers.

Police have carried on a continuous wide search for Durkin ever since he shot and killed Edward Shannon, a federal officer three weeks ago and Wednesday night they received a tip that he would show up at a south side house.

A dozen policemen stationed themselves in and around the house. Shortly after 11 o'clock Durkin approached house accompanied by a woman. As soon as he saw the police he placed the woman in front of him and started shooting with two guns. Eleven of his bullets found a mark in Austin, owner of the house and the other one hit Sergeant Grey. Durkin pushed into the house and escaped through a back door to where a closed car was awaiting him.

Police found the car abandoned three blocks away, the interior of the machine being strewn with female wearing apparel.

The best investigators of the federal department have conducted an unremitting search for Durkin since he shot Shannon in a garage three weeks ago, where the federal officer was hidden to arrest him on a charge of stealing an automobile at Los Angeles. Durkin escaped after the shooting and since then has been "discovered" in various parts of the country.

### FILM MAGNATE LOSES WHISKEY

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Fourteen barrels of rare liquors worth \$10,000 have been stolen here from Jesse L. Lasky, film magnate, it was revealed Wednesday night.

The liquor had been sent from Hollywood, some days ago and was in a box car at the Pennsylvania freight station. Tuesday three moving vans backed up to the box car. The door was opened and three masked, armed men confronted the movers.

They were locked in the car and the bandits did the loading themselves and drove off in the vans.

Funeral services will be held from Whitlock's mortuary, at 2:30 this afternoon, with Rev. J. Henry Thomas of St. Paul's Episcopal church officiating. Interment will be made in Lakewood cemetery.

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
