With Cigar Company.—Business men visiting in the city this week-end include L. C. DeBarth and Bert Solomon, representatives of the General Cigar company.

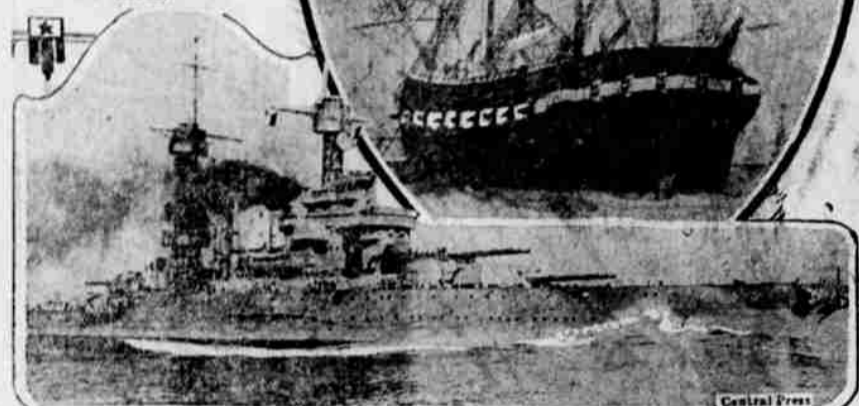

Navy celebrates its 150th birthday Oct. 27, which also is the birthday of Theodore Roosevelt. On Oct. 27, 1775, a special committee of the Continental Congress recommended the purchase of the first vessels of war for the U. S. navy. The first battleship, U. S. S. Alfred, shown at right, was commissioned Dec. 23 of same year, with Lt. John Paul Jones commanding. Below is one of the most powerful warships of the present navy, U. S. S. California, with a range 200 times greater than that of the Alfred.
