## GOVERNOR PIERCE SAYS A. J. WESTON FRAME-UP VICTIM

SALEM, Oct. 30.—(United News)—In a statement made public here Friday Gov. Pierce gives it as his opinion that A. J. Weston, released from the state prison here on a full pardon from the governor, was the victim of a frame-up and was entirely innocent of the murder of Robert Krug, aged Deschutes county recluse, for which crime he had been sentenced to a life term in the penitentiary.

This opinion the governor declares is based on an exhaustive investigation of the circumstances surrounding the death of the aged recluse and on interviews with Weston and with James Stilwell and Joe Wilson, on whose testimony Weston was convicted.

These investigations, Gov. Pierce declares, have convinced him that Krug was not murdered, but was burned to death in a fire probably started from cigarettes. "I granted a full pardon to Jack Weston after becoming thoroughly convinced that he was innocent of the murder of Krug," the statement of the governor reads.
