MURDERED GIRL'S STORY ADMITTED BY COURT ORDER

Dying Statement of Social Worker Attacked By Men Held Admissible

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Oct. 30.—(United News)—Miss Madge Oberholtzer's own dramatic story of her alleged mistreatment by D. C. Stephenson, Earl Klenck and Earl Gentry will be introduced Saturday in an attempt by the state to prove the three men were responsible for her death.

As the second day of testimony taking drew to a close late Friday the prosecution brought out its prize evidence—Miss Oberholtzer's dying statement—and asked permission to place it before the jury. Judge Will Sparks, hearing the case against the former grand dragon of the state Ku Klux Klan and his two henchmen, ruled the statement could be introduced.

The reading of the dying girl's own words, undoubtedly will mark a climax in this case which has attracted such wide attention. The contents of the statement already has been made known.

It relates that Miss Oberholtzer, an Indianapolis social worker was enticed to Stephenson's mansion last March on the pretense of business. There the statement says, she was made dizzy by wine that Stephenson forced her to drink and then was carried off to a train.

In a drawing room of a sleeping car Stephenson and Klenck are accused of attacking her. Much of the detail of this episode, as outlined by the statement, is unprintable. It was here, the statement says, that Miss Oberholtzer received the bruises and lacerations with which she was disfigured when brought back to her Indianapolis home two days later.

In a Hammond, Ind. hotel to which Stephenson and his aides are alleged to have taken her, Miss Oberholtzer swallowed poison. There is a dispute as to whether she died of the poison that she swallowed or of blood poisoning resulting from her wounds.

Judge Sparks' ruling on the statement came at the end of a day replete with legal wrangling. When court opened attorneys for the defense asked the judge to dismiss the jurors on the grounds they had been prejudiced by this statement of the court.

"It is the duty of the jury to decide whether a very virtuous young woman would regard her virtue as dearer than her life."

Judge Sparks reserved a decision on the defense motion until afternoon and then overruled it. Indications that defense attorneys will attempt to prove Miss Oberholtzer was forced to make her dying statement and that attempts were made to extort money from Stephenson were given by defense at-

torneys during the cross-examination of state witnesses.
Asa Smith, attorney for the Oberholtzer family, was questioned closely about the origin of the statement in which Stephenson and his aides were accused. Eph Inman asked Smith if he did not go to Stephenson's office and attempt to sell the girl's statement for \$100,000. Smith denied this.
