

STARKEY WINS IN 9TH. RD. ON FOUL

Stolz and Sams Fight Draw In Six Fast Rounds, House Crowded

Kid Starkey, of Klamath Falls, won over Johnny Trambitas, of Portland, in the ninth round of what was scheduled to be a ten-round go in Scandinavian hall here last night on a foul. Both men were battling in the corner and in the mix-up, Starkey claimed he was fouled. In this the referee concurred and the bout was off, with the local boy the winner.

Outside of that feature it was a good bout. Both men were in good condition and gave a top-notch exhibition of clever battling right from the first round.

In anticipation of a good card, the hall was well filled with fans. They were justified, for the card held a list of fighters the like of which is hard to get in this city. Trambitas is an experienced fighter, and Starkey had trained faithfully, or at least he appeared to be in better condition than during his bout with Mike De Pinto on October 26.

Starkey weighed in at 140. Trambitas at 139. Right from the start Starkey went after his man as usual. He had a little tougher customer than with De Pinto, however, and Trambitas straightened him up more than once.

Starkey employed rushing tactics throughout. During the second, third and fourth rounds both men gave and took some hard wallops, Starkey using rights and lefts to face and body, Trambitas employing

a wicked left, following at times with a right to the heart that resounded through the entire building when it landed against Starkey's ribs.

In the second Trambitas hit Starkey low, the Klamath boy running into a left swing for the pit. The blow did no damage, and things were evened up in the next round when Starkey shoved over a bad one. In the eighth round Starkey started from his corner evidently with intention of going right after Trambitas. He was stopped effectively on three occasions when he employed vicious rushes, with short arm hooks to the body.

In the ninth, both fighters were hitting up the pace when the foul was declared, which ended the bout. The fans would have given much to see the battle go another round.

Earl Stolz and Chuck Sams, in the semi-windup, however, furnished the real sensation of the evening. These two boys fought to a draw here on October 20. Since then, according to reports, Chuck announced he was going after Stolz, and it looked like it last night. He did no damage, however, for the Bend boy was too clever for him. Chuck opened up an old cut on Stolz and landed a couple of telling blows during the six rounds, but the fans seemed to think Stolz had the last three rounds.

When the referee announced the fight as a draw, the fans booed him for a full five minutes. During the interim, between the end of the fight and announcing the decision, the fans called for "Stolz" from all parts of the house, and it seemed to be the consensus of opinion that the Bend boy had the better of it. But aside from those differences it was a bout well worth paying any man's money to see. It pleased the fans in that respect, anyway.

Jack Crim and W. Harrington also scored a great hit with the fans in their four-round preliminary. This fight, also called a draw, met with distinct approval of the referee.

It was a good battle, and both boys were giving the best they had. They both had asked for it, and finally Matchmaker Sylvester gave them their chance. They made good and received a great hand from the crowd when the battle was over.

In the first bout of the evening, Henry Burke kay-o'd Kid Sullivan, the only man that could be found to go on with him last night. There was a lot of entertainment, according to opinion of fans who saw the match, but Henry was too much for Sullivan.

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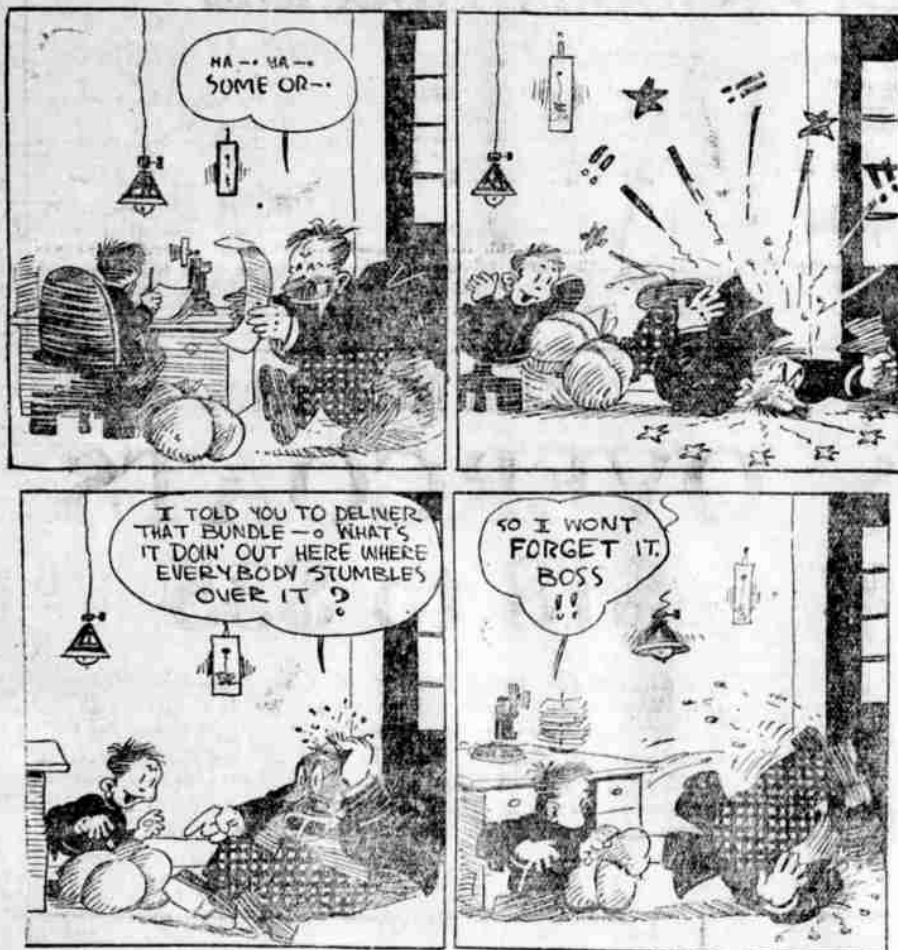
