LOST RIVER DAIRY GETS HIGH SCORE

Report of Sanitary Inspector For Month of October Shows Improvement

Reports of sanitary and dairy inspections have been filed with the city by Lee Craft, sanitary police officer, for the month of October, and show an increase in the percentage of equipment, methods and cleaning facilities.

Final scores, compiled by Craft, showed the Lost River dairy, belonging to McKendree and Klatt, leading the list with 35.5 equipment; 56 percentage methods, and 91.8 final score.

Others ranked as follows: Mountain dairy, Clara E. Coleman, 89; Palace dairy, O. P. Couchman, 83; Holliday dairy, 83; Bradley dairy, Clyde Bradley, 79.5; Hale dairy, Hale Bros. 72.5; Premium dairy, Motchotetz, 72; East Side dairy, Bert West, 57; Del Fatte, Del Fatte, 52; Ayrshire, Emil Schiesel, 47.5.

Reports from Craft, approved by Dr. G. S. Newsom of the Klamath county health unit, showed 27 general inspections, 17 dairy inspections, 45 restaurant inspections, six drinking water cases, seven milk inspections, four cases reported to the police judge and notices served, and six cases of scarlet fever, chicken pox and typhoid fever.

In brief, their testimony for the state was that Miss Oberholzer did not die of the poison she had taken, because the organs this poison usually affect were almost back to normal when her death occurred. James Carver, of the Indiana Bell Telephone company, testified that he had checked up on Stephenson's telephone calls on the day of the alleged abduction, finding that the former klan dragon telephoned to Miss Oberholzer's home four times during the day.

BOY SCOUTS HAVE FULL TIME CHIEF

For the first time in the history of Klamath Falls, Boy Scouts will have a full time executive for the city and Klamath county only.

Yesterday Everett O. Nord, who has been obtained by the Klamath Boy Scout council to serve as full-time man in the work of scouts, sat in his office in the Klamath county chamber of commerce rooms, outlining work for the coming year, and work to be accomplished not only by the executive, but the scouts as well.

Four troops are now organized and functioning in Klamath Falls. Another has been organized in Merrill, and another in Bonanza, making six in all in the county. According to Nord, it is his desire to complete the work of organizing several more troops in Klamath Falls and then working with outside troops.

Nord recently returned from Portland, where he conferred with coast and state officials in regard to the Klamath Falls work. He found that a tract of land, one of the most beautiful sites on the coast, has been turned over toward scout work for a summer scout camp. The land is located near Tillamook on the ocean, in the vicinity of Cape Lookout. Boys of Klamath Falls troops will have an opportunity to attend the camp, and before the end of the school spring term Nord hopes to have devised a plan whereby all scouts may attend the summer scout camp in the north.

City Schools To Close November 11

All city schools in Klamath Falls will be closed on Armistice day, November 11, according to an announcement made yesterday by J. Percy Wells, superintendent of public schools.

The entire day will be free, and previously to that time observances of Armistice day will be held in individual rooms of schools in the city, under the direction of the teachers.

SCHOOL BOARD DECIDES ON ROOM COLOR SCHEME

School board members held an informal meeting yesterday in the new Fremont school to confer with the painting contractor to decide upon the color combination to be used in the rooms of the school building.

A light cream was decided upon for the ceilings, although other colors were not chosen. Today the members of the board will meet again for discussion of the work with a number of combinations painted by the contractor.

BRAMHALL TO ERECT \$3,500 WAREHOUSE

Announcement of the building of a \$3500 warehouse has been made by J. N. Bramhall of Klamath Falls, who will erect the structure in the near future. The building will be located in lot 4, block 60 of Second Hot Springs addition, facing Spring street.

Dimensions for the building will be 50x112, and, according to Bramhall, probably be constructed of galvanized iron. The building will be used for storing grain and potatoes.
