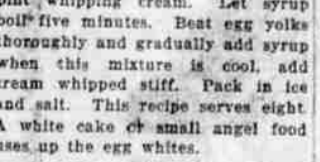
TODAY'S RECIPES

- Muffins**—One egg, one tablespoon sugar, two tablespoons melted butter, one cup milk, two and one-quarter cups flour, four teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon salt. Beat egg well, add sugar and butter and salt. Sift flour with baking powder and add alternately with milk. Bake in muffin pans 20 minutes. By adding one cup cornmeal in place of one cup of flour you will have cornbread mixture.
- Harlequin Conserve**—Twenty-five yellow peaches, one pound white grapes, ten red plums, one can pineapple or fresh pineapple, one orange, one-quarter pound blanched almonds, sugar. Wash all fruit. Pare peaches, plums and pineapple (if fresh is used). Cut into small pieces. Halve grapes and remove seeds. Slice orange very thin without removing peel and cook all fruit over slow fire until soft and well blended. Measure and allow three-quarter cup of sugar to each cup of fruit. Cook gently for 20 minutes, then add almonds, chopped, and continue cooking slowly until conserve is thick and clear, about two hours.
- Steak a la Chilli**—Left over strlops or porterhouse is especially good with the following gravy: Fry one onion in butter until brown, add enough flour to make a paste. Then stir in cold water to make gravy. When thickened add one teaspoon kitchen bouquet and two tablespoons chili sauce. Add steak cut in as large pieces as possible.
- Maple Mousse**—Take one cup of maple syrup, four egg yolks and one pint whipping cream. Let syrup boil five minutes. Beat egg yolks thoroughly and gradually add syrup when this mixture is cool, add cream whipped stiff. Pack in ice and salt. This recipe serves eight. A white cake of small angel food uses up the egg whites.

SCOUTING

Activities are falling fast and furiously upon the heads of those interested in Klamath county scout work, and particularly upon the shoulders of Everett O. Nord, now full-time man employed by the Klamath county scout council.

A meeting of patrol leaders is announced for November 26, 27 and 28, to be held in Portland. The meeting is available to all patrol leaders, senior patrol leaders and scribes. It is the hope of Nord to obtain six delegates from Klamath Falls to the state convention.

The meeting is more of a training conference, and leading scout men of Oregon will be present for the affair. A registration fee of \$1.50 will be asked, and arrangements for transportation will be made through the executive council.

The conference includes a banquet Friday night, a luncheon Saturday noon, and a closing service on Sunday morning.

On Friday night Governor Walter Pierce will present the eagle scout badges, none of which will be awarded to Klamath boys.

Under the head of "Things To Be Done," in Boy Scout work, Everett O. Nord, scout executive of Klamath county, has named six major objects which the boys will undertake this winter.

First of all is the leaders ski hike to Crater Lake to look into the practicability of a winter camp at the resort for the scouts.

A camp rally with entertainment, is scheduled next, all dates of the affairs to be announced later.

Pop-wow initiation, tenderfoot investiture for all new scouts holds a prominent place, as does the fourth item on the winter's program, that of the formation of a council ring to be organized for outdoor meetings.

A photographic contest, which will interest all scouts with cameras to either borrow or lend, is to be held during the winter season.

Organization of a ski troop and pine tree patrol will be made in the near future, among the older boys of the troops, or boys over sixteen years of age. All boys who are interested in this phase of the program are asked to confer with Nord as soon as possible.

Scout troop No. 2, under the leadership of Percy Murray, will meet tonight at 7:15 at the chamber of commerce with Everett Nord, in charge of the evening's entertainment. The meeting of the scouts has not yet been determined, and scouts will gather at the chamber rooms and proceed to their meeting place.

A court of honor, composed of leading business men of Klamath Falls before which all scouts appear prior to receiving their badges and awards, has been formed with several places on the court left vacant. The names will be announced later.

The court of honor, according to Mr. Nord, is one of the most vital organizations in scout life. It gives an incentive for which the younger scouts may work, and an ideal plane for the older scouts to achieve.

Complete re-organization of Boy Scout troops in Klamath county will be made in the near future, according to Everett O. Nord, who has been spending the major portion of his time since taking over the executive offices of the Klamath council, in planning new troops for the various churches, districts and schools in the county.
