TOOZE CANDIDATE FOR STATE CHIEF

Editor of Teachers Monthly Seeks Election to Job Of Superintendent

F. J. Tooze, editor of the Oregon Teachers Monthly, has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination at the May primary, for state school superintendent.

The publication refers to the candidate as follows: Mr. Tooze has had extensive educational training and successful experience in school teaching and administration, including the following:

Preparation: Common schools of Michigan. Graduated from Michigan state normal college, Bachelor Pedagogy, six-year course; Michigan university, B. A. and advanced work in educational history, philosophy and administration.

Experience: Taught in rural schools several years; teacher and principal of village schools four years; superintendent of city schools, including nine years in Oregon City, fourteen years; educational work in Y. M. C. A. and teacher-training in Portland public schools, two years. County institute instructor. Member of committee on education in sessions of the 1923 and 1925 legislatures, and chairman of the senate ways and means committee during the last session. Has worked consist-

ently at all times for the best interests of the schools and the teachers of the state. Engaged in Y. M. C. A. educational work and gave liberally also of his time and efforts to welfare work during the world war.

At present he is editor and manager of the Oregon Teachers Monthly, Oregon's educational magazine; edits the Pacific Homestead, one of the leading periodicals of the northwest and finds time to contribute regularly editorials on educational, civic and political matters to the Oregon Statesman, one of the state's leading dailies.

He is a church member, granger, and belongs to the Pythian and Modern Woodmen orders.

ASSISTANT MANAGER COTTON CONCERN DEAD IN TIJUANA

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 5.—T. M. N. George, found dead in Tijuana, with his skull broken, was assistant manager of the Cotton Insurance association here, and was on a business trip, when his death occurred.

George left Atlanta about two weeks ago for a trip through the southwest. He went to Tijuana from Dallas, Texas.

News reached Mrs. George here that her husband was seriously ill in Tijuana, and she knew of his death only when she read news dispatches.

George is survived by his widow, a son, his mother, one sister and two brothers. His recently deceased father was a rector of the Episcopal church.

George was 37 years old, and a member of the order of Elks, through which organization his body was identified.
