STATE DEPARTMENT TO PROBE KILLING OF AMERICAN BROKER

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 5.—An international investigation into the death and possible murder of T. M. N. George, wealthy Atlanta, Ga., cotton dealer, who failed to "sober up" after he was beaten and robbed on the streets of Tijuana, and later lodged in the Mexican jail there, loomed today after an autopsy revealed that George's skull had been broken in.

The state department at Washington will probably be requested to open the negotiations with the Mexican authorities at once. George, who had been a heavy winner on the gambling tables at the Mexican resort, is said to have been slugged, and after his wallet, believed to have contained a large sum, was taken from him, he was thrown into jail. The morning after his imprisonment, prison officials discovered that George had failed to recover consciousness, and he was sent to the county hospital at San Diego, where he died without recovering. Earlier medical attention might have saved his life, the county coroner here said.

PAVING COMPANY COMPLETES WORK

All paving work which has been contracted for in the name of the Warren Construction company has been finished, according to Major Arnold, in charge of the work in this city which was consummated yesterday afternoon.

With the exception of two blocks located on Fifth and Second streets, now in the name of Dunn & Baker

the paving program for the city to date is completed.

Seven districts of paving have been mastered by the construction company at an approximate cost of \$160,000. The districts include 36A, Walnut and Oak streets; Eldorado and Huron; Ninth from Pine and High; Washington street from Seventh to Eighth; Lincoln street from Eleventh to the cemetery; Jefferson street from Ninth to the Canal; alleys in block 14 and 15; alley in block 17.

Major Arnold is remaining in Klamath to take charge of the Dunn & Baker contract which will be complete by Thanksgiving, he stated last night.
