Grants Pass to Meet Local Footballers In Last of League Games

Primed to the last notch, Klamath Falls will trot out on the local grid-iron this afternoon at two o'clock to meet Grants Pass in the last league game of the season before the pigskin is smothered in moth-balls.

True to form, Klamath should be sluggish in her last game of the season as every team is with material wear shown with game after game making inroads into her strength. But it's with pep of their initial game that the Klamath mud-eaters will receive or return the ball today as the toss may go.

Yesterday afternoon practically every student in the high school turned out for a rally taking advantage of the crowds on the streets during the noon hour to advertise their last league game.

If Klamath comes out this afternoon with the crown of laurel leaves as well as the mud which she will track from the field, her place will be next to Medford and showing a good chance to place first in the next season's play. If Klamath should make second place this will be the first time in her athletic history that she has been a runner-up for the championship of southern Oregon.

MERCY MURDERER DEFENSE HOPEFUL

LITTLETON, Colo., Nov. 6.—The "mercy murder" of Hazel Ingram Blazer, 32 year-old "human hulk" may have been conceived in a mind temporarily unbalanced by grief and worry and hazed by

chloroform fumes aimed at self-destruction.

This new theory of the tragedy enacted in the gloom shrouded Blazer home last February when Dr. Harold E. Blazer, a widower, administered poison to his helpless imbecile daughter and then thought to end his own life was advanced Friday by Dr. Hugh H. Aldredge, the first physician to attend Blazer.

Called as a state witness Dr. Aldredge testified in effect that the kindly old country doctor, who contends that he knows nothing of his daughter's murder only that what has been told him, might have been insane at the time he killed.

Defense attorneys were visibly elated by Dr. Aldredge's admission on the stand and are expected to seize upon his testimony to strengthen their insanity plea.

WINE CONFISCATED ON PELICAN PLACE

State Prohibition Officer L. L. McBride yesterday announced that he has issued a warrant for the arrest of S. Santo, of Pelican City, charged with the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor.

About four gallons of wine were seized by the prohibition men, McBride said. He added that a wine press with a capacity of about 500 gallons was seized.
