## JURY RETURNS 5 TRUE BILLS IN REPORT TO COURT

Five true bills, three not true bills and six secret indictments were returned by the Klamath county grand jury when it made a partial report here yesterday.

As a result of the action taken by the deliberating body, Luz Laucedo, Mexican laborer, charged with the killing of Florentino Navarro, at Algoma, August 18, was yesterday parading the streets of Klamath Falls, a free man.

The jurors held there was not sufficient evidence to hold the man originally alleged to have been responsible for the death of a Southern Pacific section hand, following a drunken party.

Other true bills returned were as follows:  
Tom Vaughn, charged with operating a distillery and arrested August 7.

Harry Davis and Tom O'Connor, accused of operating a still and arrested September 11.

Perry John, arrested August 2 for felonious assault on a minor girl.

Roy Darling, arrested August 3, and charged with a statutory offense.

The not true bills, excluding Laucedo, were returned in the cases of Earl Brown, charged with uttering a check without funds October 1, and George W. Duke, accused of

assault on Cecil G. Hollinshead, while armed with a dangerous weapon. The alleged attack was said to have occurred at Odell lake. Yesterday morning, following its partial report, the grand jury adjourned until Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. A report to be made later, is expected to be of an unusual nature.
