URBANA, Ill., Nov. 7.—"Red" Grange and his university of Illinois mates emerged victorious here this afternoon over Coach A. A. Stagg's Chicago Maroons, 13 to 6.

The game was a comedy of errors and fumbles and spills, all of which were due to the worst playing conditions the two teams have ever been forced to face. A driving rain fell during most of the game. The air was chilly and the field was soaked. The ball was so slippery and water drenched that it was continually dropping from some player's hands.

MICHIGAN LOSES TO NOR'WESTERN 3 TO 2

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—(United Press)—Northwestern, for many years the under dog of the western conference, crashed back to life this afternoon and gave the football world another upset by defeating the powerful Michigan team 3 to 2. Michigan, conqueror of Illinois, was unable to suppress the revived Wild Cats. Northwestern got the jump in the first quarter by working the ball near enough to the Michigan goal line to make a field goal. In the final quarter Michigan scored a safety by blocking a kick attempted by Northwestern from behind its goal line.

COUGARS' TAIL IS TWISTED IN GAME WITH BEARS 35-0

Bruins Overcome Wild Over Head Attack During Closing Quarter

MEMORIAL STADIUM, BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 7.—The Golden Bear attacked the Cougar with sharpened claws here this afternoon, and after 60 minutes of one-sided football California had defeated Washington State college, 35 to 0.

California was not forced to show anything spectacular to win. Line backs, a deceptive reverse, and a fake reverse pulled the northerners out of position repeatedly. The game was too obviously uneven to be particularly interesting from the spectators' viewpoint.

Coach Andy Smith started the full strength of the Bruin team, while Coach A. A. Exendine threw several second string men into his starting line-up.

Without wasting time, California started down the field from the 20-yard line and in 15 plays Jabs had scored on a push through center for two yards.

That completed the scoring in the first quarter, but the Bears opened up in the second period and shortly after play had started Dixon tore loose on an off-tackle saunter, making 56 yards and a touchdown. He merely trotted on the last 20 yards, so far had he out-distanced his pursuers.

Jabs scored the third touchdown after a determined Bear sweep down to the shadow of the goal posts. The half ended with a 21 to 0 score in favor of California.

In the second half Mell scored on a long pass from Dixon, the first tried by California in the game. The Bear superiority was shown again in the final period when Griffin, who had gone in with numerous substitutes, scored the last touchdown for California.

The Cougars played their best in the second quarter, when on two occasions they passed their way to the Bears' 30-yard line. They opened a wild overhead attack in the closing quarter, but while some of the tosses made good gains, the assault was not sustained.

Jabs was the individual star of the game in ground gaining. The elusive line puncher made 141 yards from scrimmage. Dixon and Imlay played well in the Bear backfield, the latter showing flashes of brilliancy in running back kicks. Carey was strong in the line, although the whole California forward wall functioned splendidly.

Kramer, Koenig, Meeker and Marker stood out for W. S. C.

California made 31 first downs to Washington's 6. The Bears made 414 yards from scrimmage, against 105 for W. S. C. California lost 65 yards through penalties, while Washington was penalized but once, for five yards. The Cougars attempted 16 forward passes, seven of which were completed for a gain of 66 yards. California completed one pass out of two attempts for a 20-yard gain.

Some 25,000 persons saw the game.

GONZAGA SLAMS WHITMAN 13-0

Fighting Missionaries Put Up Strong Battle In Four Fast Quarters

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 7.—Gonzaga university defeated Whitman at football here today, 13 to 0, in a contest marked by an unusually strong defensive showing by Whitman. The team that battled Haskell to a 16-9 score a week ago, was unable to work its pass attack against the fighting missionaries, and two touchdowns, one on a 50-yard off tackle back by Lane, were all Gonzaga could muster.

The half ended with no score, although the winners were on the offensive most of the way. Lane's first touchdown came two minutes after the third period opened, and he place-kicked the added point. In the fourth period Lane backed the ball over in three off-tackle thrusts after Hunton had given the Bull Dogs a big advantage by his end runs.

The entire Whitman line stood out on defense, while Webster's punting, end runs and returns of punts formed Whitman's biggest threat. Hunton and Lane on offense and Cyrs on defense were Gonzaga's best bets.

HERMAN-STARKEY BOOKED TO FIGHT IN CITY NOV. 16

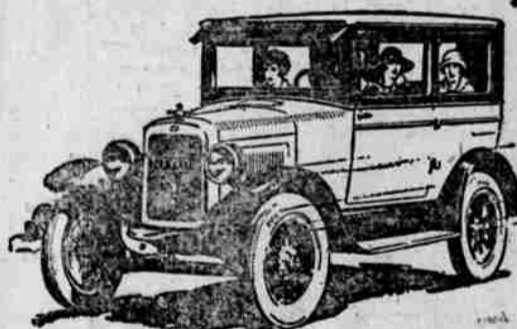
Matchmaker Sylvester Also Gets Hal Reece for Go With Jack Crim
