### Trambitas Substituted For Herman, and Harrington Is Slated For Crim

Following close upon his manager's agreement to come here and fight Kid Starkey in the next card at the Scandinavian or Scandia Hall, Cal Herman yesterday wired Manager Sylvester he would not be able to come to Klamath Falls. Herman stated he was not yet recovered from illness and would be in no shape to enter the ring for the next attraction here.

Last evening Matchmaker Johnnie Sylvester said he would sign Trambitas for another go with Starkey. On the last card Trambitas lost out on a foul in the last section of the ninth round. After it was over most of the fans stated they would like to see the bout go the limit of ten rounds. It was generally conceded that Starkey had the best of the mill at that time. With another bout coming up things should be interesting when Trambitas again meets the local boy.

Those who know Trambitas and who saw him fight expressed the opinion that while he announced he was in good shape, he did not seem to put up as good a battle as he has been known to do in times past.

Wilbur Harrington has also agreed to meet Jack Crim in the coming card. Harrington says the fans who spread the rumor that his hesitation to meet Crim in not immediately signing up, was because he was afraid to, are all moist. Everything being agreeable, Harrington is ready to go on, so that's that. Hal Reece would have been the alternative for Harrington, but Sylvester thought the local fans would rather see a return go between Crim and Harrington than an outsider. Both of these two boys staged a real battle here Nov. 3 when they proved a real drawing card.

No one has been secured to take on Henry Burke as yet, but Matchmaker Sylvester says he will have some one for him before the night the events are staged.

According to the doctor in attendance, the jaundice and pneumonia traces have practically disappeared, and Carter is fighting typhoid fever.

## KLAMATH HI WINS SECOND PLACE IN FOOTBALL LEAGUE

### Local Team Runner-up For First Time In History Of Game Here

When the final whistle of Saturday's game, Klamath county high school versus Grants Pass, found Klamath on top and holding second place in the southern Oregon league, the football season for 1925 ended.

For the first time in its history, Klamath had been a runner-up for the championship.

Rome was not built in a day. Nor can a coach take practically raw material and build from it a winning team in a few short weeks.

But what Coach French has done this season is to pave the way for a

prize winning team next year when Klamath romps over her competitors and places first in the league. Klamath is losing five good men by graduation. Roland Cofer, who played well in all league games of the season, played his last league game Saturday. Cofer is the only backfield man who will go.

On the line Joe Bliss, Leslie Elmore, Bill Bessler and Forrest Colson will be missed.

These five men won their "K" which is the reward gained by every man who puts in the required number of playing minutes.

Graduation will not, however, mar the Barnes-Hall-Carroll combination that wrecked Grants Pass' hopes on Saturday, and proved the undoing of Ashland twice during the valley team's encounter with the local boys.

Using as a nucleus the remaining seven men who have won their letters, French is planning a brilliant team, familiar with his type of football, and ready to hold the championship of 1926 in their hands.

On Wednesday, Armistice day, the Alturas team will meet Klamath on the local field. This game will not count in league scores.
